Besides these two parties have been looking over the location with a view of putting in a store.

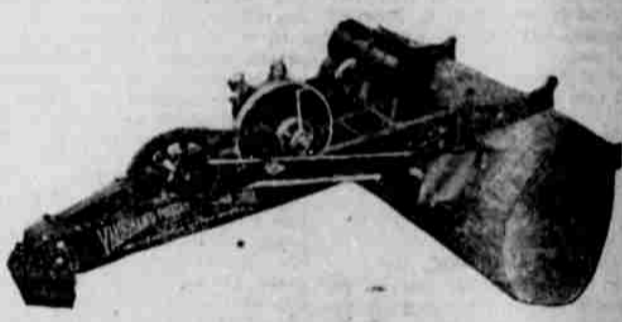
