

YOUNG FAWNS ARE PROTECTED

The state game warden's office, through Game Warden Brown of this county, sounds a warning to people not to molest young fawns by capture. No permission will be given for their capture and rearing except in cases where the mother is known to be dead.

The following circular touching on the subject has been issued by the game warden's department:

"In past seasons there has been many instances of people capturing young fawns and then asking permission from the department to hold and rear them. Two such instances have occurred so far this season.

"It is the consensus of opinion that the mother deer knows where her young ones are at all times and that if the fawns are unmolested the mother will find and provide for them. This will conserve the deer which are the property of the state.

"Therefore, except in instances where the mother is known to be dead, no permission will be granted by this department to hold deer taken during closed season and the law which covers the taking of deer during closed season will be enforced."
