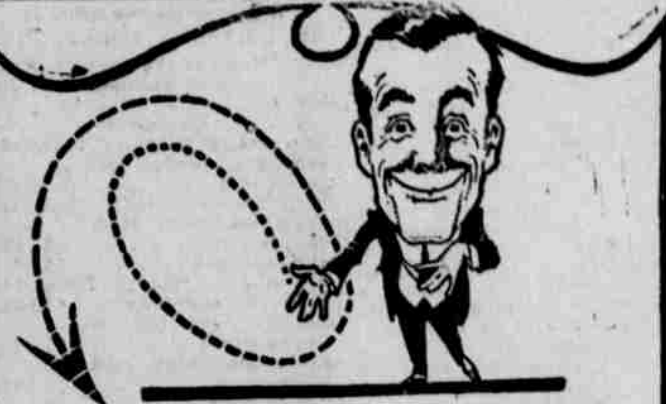
Charles M. Reed, Plaintiff, vs. Alice Reed, Defendant.

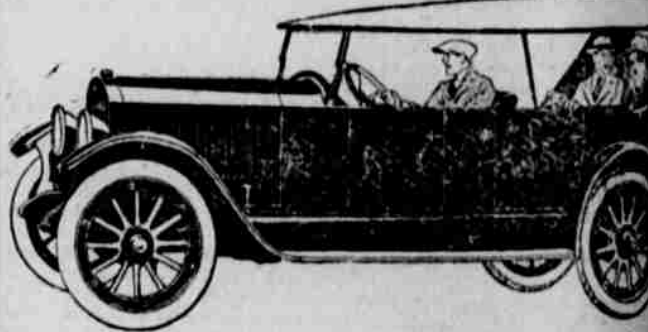
