**Weekly Lumber Review**

The first full week under new freight rates—the week ending September 4th—shows continued dropping off of business from territory east of the Mississippi river.

For the week under review Association mills report only 835 cars of new business. That was 1,420 cars less than normal; and approximately 500 cars less than the average for the period immediately preceding the effective date of the freight rate advance, during which period normal business was not possible on account of car shortage.

Car shortage, with the exception of open equipment, has practically ceased to exist in the Pacific Northwest lumber industry by reason of lessened demand for cars. Whereas, during the greater part of the year, mills only 30 to 40 per cent of car requirements, they are now, in many instances, turning back cars spotted for immediate loading.

New business accepted during the week under review, totaled 39,648,059 feet, of which 25,050,000 feet was for rail delivery; 12,706,378 feet was for water delivery; and 1,841,681 feet for local delivery.

Production, at 47,115,152 feet, was sixteen per cent under normal for the mills reporting. New business was approximately fifty-one per cent less than production.

Shipments for the week totaled 49,459,780 feet, which was twenty-six per cent below production.

The shipping total included 36,450,000 feet by rail; 3,196,254 feet by auto truck and team; 5,269,683 feet by domestic cargoes; and 4,553,843 feet export.

Unshipped orders in the rail trade are now down to 5,969 cars against a normal of 12,000 cars for the mills participating in the weekly report.

In the domestic cargo business the unshipped balance is 86,243,918 feet. In export the unshipped balance is 45,753,497 feet.

**Butter Fat Rate Varies**

Butterfat content varies from 3.4 per cent to 6.3 per cent in the production of cow-testing association cows for July, according to the official report by E. B. Flitts, in charge for O. A. C. The high figures come from "Pennie," the grade Jersey owned by L. A. McCormack of Tillamook, who broke the association record for high production the month before. Pennie is second for July with 105 1/2 pounds of fat, and her herd mate, "Pal," is first with 107.12 pounds.

**Bees Need Winter Protection**

Bees do not hibernate as most insects do, but keep the temperature of the colony above 57 degrees in cold weather by forming a cluster and producing heat by movement of wings, legs, and other parts of the body.
