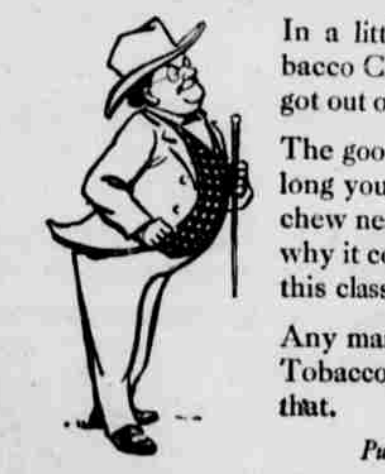
32 Bum Cows Detected

Thirty-two boarder cows were detected and eliminated from the nine cow-testing associations of Oregon in July. The 5671 cows tested averaged 742 pounds of milk with 32.05 pounds of fat for the month, says the report of E. B. Fitts, federal and O. A. C. dairyman. Honor cows—producing more than 40 pounds of fat per month—were 1337. The highest was "Pal," a grade Jersey cow belonging to L. A. Cochran of Tillamook, with a record of 107.12 pounds of fat. "Pennie," who broke the pounds of fat. Pal is in the same association record in June with 115.6 pounds of fat.

Bank robbers are keeping right up to date. An Oregon bank is reported to have been robbed the other day of a quantity of knives and shoes. MUST NOT KILL PIGEONS SAYS U. S. OFFICIAL

Pigeon shooting in Clatsop county must cease according to the announcement made yesterday by federal agents who were in the city investigating the reports that the pigeons were being killed by hunters in this county, says the Astorian. The visit of the agents to Astoria brings about an analogous situation. The state law provides that pigeons may be killed, whereas the federal law says they must not be killed in Clatsop county under penalty of a fine and imprisonment. This section which includes the law against pigeons says: Under the regulation for the protection of migratory birds the season is closed on handtied pigeons, swans, wood ducks, etc., in the United States and Canada. As far as can be learned by the Mist, the above also applies to Columbia county.
