There are now 11,000 bills awaiting consideration in the house of representatives. At one session recently 3,000 bills were introduced in seven minutes. Over 25,000 have been introduced at this session.

Judge Robert Eakin has been renominated as judge of the Eighth Judicial District. He has made an ideal judge and the people will be glad to have his services in that capacity as long as he may want the office.

Orders have been issued to reduce the forces in the Philippines from 45,000 to 32,000 men. The withdrawal will be made gradually, one regiment at a time. In the mean time the force of school teachers has been augmented by another shipment of 200. This is civilization that civilizes.—Ex.

Citizens tickets have been placed in the field in the counties of Multnomah, Clackamas and Clatsop, against the Republican tickets as nominated by the partisans of Mitchell. The objects of the citizens tickets are to down C. W. Fulton in Clatsop, Geo. W. Brownell in Clackamas and a whole gang in Multnomah.

One of the strict rules of the postoffice department is that the names of the following states and territories shall never be abbreviated in the directing of a letter; Alaska, Hawaii, Idaho, Iowa, Ohio, Oregon, Samoa and Utah. The reason is obvious, Ala. might be mistaken for Alabama; Id. for Indiana; O. for either Ohio, Oregon or Oklahoma; Io. for Idaho, etc.

The Herald last week in giving advice to E. A. Holmes, of Wallowa, says: "Mr. Holmes should smother all disappointments and personal feeling and rally to the support of Mr. McCully. This is the spirit of true Republicanism." The Herald is certainly right, and we are sure that Messrs. McCully and Scriber will not find Mr. Holmes sending men out to Paradise and other parts of Union and Wallowa counties advising Republicans to vote against the Republican nominees, nor will they hear Mr. Holmes rejoicing over a Democratic victory.

Within a few weeks, on the 20th of May, the United States troops will be withdrawn from the Island of Cuba, and the people of that Island will start out for themselves as an independent republic. They have elected General Palma as their first President. They had long waged war with Spain to secure their independence, and apparently never would have succeeded without the powerful assistance of the armies and navy of the United States. Now Cuba takes its place as an independent nation among the nations of the world. Will the Cubans use wisely the freedom and independence that so speedily came to them under circumstances different than any other nation ever achieved liberty and independence? Time alone will tell. If they do the people of the United States will rejoice. It is the general opinion that within a few years the Cubans will seek annexation to the United States, and that the Cuban republic will eventually become a part of this country.

PULLMAN ORDINARY SLEEPERS.

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Company has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These

cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping," and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths, keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passenger. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
