The Salmon Hatchery.

Every one but very few people of Wallowa county know anything of the methods used in the propagation of salmon by the process of a hatchery, and no doubt there are a great many who are not so much aware of the fact that we have one of these great and intricate industries within the borders of Wallowa county, which is so rapidly shutting off our supply of brain food.

great success, having eclipsed any other hatchery in the state for having turned out the greatest number of young fish, that it was decided this year to stop the July run of Chinook and Blueback salmon.

Deputy Fish Commissioner Allen has a force of men at work building another rack across the Grande Ronde, some three hundred yards above the first one erected. When this is completed a passage will be opened in the lower rack and the fish permitted to rush forward into the great slaughter pen prepared for them.

Then the fish are raised out and the eggs are placed in small shallow buckets arranged on a slight incline so that a small stream of pure clear water is allowed to flow over the eggs continuously until the eggs are hatched, which requires from 40 to 50 days.

It has been conclusively proved that the salmon hatcheries of Oregon are a wonderful boon to the fishing industry of the state, as the salmon in the Columbia river are getting more numerous each year, although millions of pounds of them are exported every season.

Wallowa county which was formerly noted for its pheasant partridge and game birds, is now being developed as a center of the fishing industry.
