### WORLD'S NEWS.

#### FROM FAR AND NEAR.

Clipped and Copied From Our Exchanges.

The returns from the Maine election are fearfully all in and the reports so far received indicate that the Republican plurality will be 26,000.

Insurance companies will not issue policies on threshing machines working in the Palouse country on account of the risk being so great.

Klamath county has followed the lead of several others in the state and stopped paying bounty on coyotes. The monthly expenditure on coyotes lately has averaged \$600. The bounty on rabbit scalps has also been discontinued.

Passengers arriving in Seattle report that Alaska volcanoes are in active eruption in three mountains, Redoubt, Klama and Augustine. The peculiar feature is that they should all be in action at once.

Considerable excitement is being caused in Baker county over a movement that is said to be on foot to divide the county by cutting off a portion of the eastern side which includes the Panhandle district and establishing a new county of which Huntington expects to be the county seat.

A farmer near Klamath, I. T., recently sprayed his cotton field with insect powder in order to kill worms that were the crop. When the cotton was ripe seven pickers went to work picking the cotton and late in the evening of that day were all taken seriously ill, several of them dying during the night.

Civilization has still a lesson or two to learn from barbarism. Professor Baldwin Spencer, professor of biology in the University of Melbourne, has spent 12 months among the wild blacks in Central Australia in the interests of ethnological science. One of his discoveries, narrated in a recent lecture, was that a mother-in-law was not allowed to come within a mile of the "mai-mai" (hut) of her married daughter. If she did so the husband was authorized by the tribal law to use his club. The professor is presumably a bachelor, for his expressed admiration of this drastic method of preserving domestic peace and tranquility.

The Postmaster-General of Australia has issued a new regulation that "no telephone messages shall contain unbecoming expressions or language calculated to provoke a breach of the peace." Assault by telephone is a rather novel offense, but possibly the Postmaster-General has had some of

his instruments or receivers smashed by offending subscribers. He has also decreed that "live wires, if properly packed, may be transmitted within the commonwealth and to and from the United Kingdom."

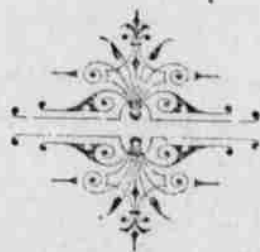
