She's a Great State.

Oregon is a great state, sparsely populated. England (for benefit of comparison has 50,867 square miles of territory, while Oregon has an area of 96,030 square miles. England has a population of 27,000,000 in excess of that of Oregon.

There are numerous cities in the United States each of which has a population greater than this entire state. The people residing in San Francisco and Oakland exceed in number all the residents of Oregon.

Three mountain ranges intersect the state on a northerly course, and several transverse ranges further subdivide it. A very large portion of these mountains bear mineral deposits of value, chiefly gold. The mineral area alone equals that of several New England states combined.

In natural and industrial resources Oregon cannot be surpassed. She can put her fisheries, cereals, fruits, stock, dairy and mineral possibilities in competition with any country of equal area anywhere, yet, by reason of her sparse population, she has but two congressmen at the national capital to represent the tremendous undeveloped aggregation of natural wealth in this wonderful state. This widely dispersed scattered little community of Oregon has worked wonders in its humble way. Oregonians need not be ashamed of their work or the results thereof. But results thus far amount to no more than a preface to the chapters in the marvelous volume of the future.—Forest Grove Times.

Privileges on Reserve.

Inasmuch as Wallowa county is to have a Forest Reserve we publish the following from the Antelope Herald: "H. D. Langille, general forestry inspector, met a number of the stockmen's union here, last Friday, and discussed with them the question of pasturage in the forest reserve. Mr. Langille stated that the aim of the government was the greatest good to the greatest number, and that the greatest interest centered in the preservation and utilization of the timber supply. He pointed out that by the setting aside of the Cascade reserve, it had been protected from the land-grabbers, and the lands had been preserved for the use of the people, subject only to proper restrictions. The chief inquiry made by the department is: What number of sheep will the reserve carry without injuring the permanency of the grazing, and how can that number be apportioned with justice to all? These matters were thoroughly discussed, and before closing his remarks, Mr. Langille stated that as long as the sheepmen will do their utmost to co-operate with the government in promoting the usefulness of the reserve, they may rest assured the grazing privilege will be extended to them."

TWO MORE FOREST RESERVES.

New Tracts in Eastern Oregon Withdrawn from Entry.

Oregonian News Bureau, Washington, Nov. 18.—On recommendation of the Geological Survey, the Secretary of the Interior today ordered the withdrawal of two additional bodies of land in Eastern Oregon, with a view to the creation of forest reserves. The one tract embraces the Powder River Mountains and contiguous country, about 250 townships in all and extends from the Snake river on the east to a point a few miles east of Union and Cove on the east, the withdrawal being boot shaped, with the toe turned north. The towns of Cornucopia and Medical Springs are about four miles south of the southern extremity of the withdrawal, while the City of Enterprise, as well as Wallowa Lake, have been excluded on the north from the original recommendation of the Geological Survey. Many private entries have been excluded. This withdrawal is also recommended by Congressman-elect Williamson.

The second withdrawal embraces about 14 townships lying along the northern end of the Blue Mountain range, following the Union and Umatilla County line, embodying all unoccupied public timber lands and the headwaters of many small streams tributary to the Grand Ronde and Umatilla Rivers. This withdrawal also extends into Washington, where it embraces about 13 townships in Asotin and Columbia Counties, being northern extremity of the Blue Mountain range. Practically all of the land included within these withdrawals is unurveyed. None of the low lands valuable for agricultural purposes have been included, and, as far as possible, all lands covered by entries, of one form or another, have been excluded. It is probable that the Presidential proclamation which will finally create these reserves will eliminate all but public lands from the final reserves, which are contemplated is much to preserve the water supply as to preserve the timber.
