**HOT FROM THE BAT.**  
"Casey" French showed he is a ball player and only needs a little experience in real games to be better than the best.

Considering the weather, which was beastly, good crowds were out. The Union boys made lots of friends by their lively playing and gentlemanly behavior.

McMillan threw his arm out in the seventh inning of the first game and retired in great pain, Cline taking his place.

A personal examination after the games showed the scalp lock of every Enterprise player fitting tight in its accustomed place.

Hug was a tower of strength in the field and at bat. He was the old hand and head needed to steady the kids.

Savage's bad throw was caused by a wet ball. He more than redeemed

himself by two grand running catches, one a high liner carried almost to the foul flag by the strong wind. W. Pidcock caught good ball and was in the game every minute. Pace and R. Pidcock also starred in all around play. Pace had 33 chances on first and accepted all except one excusable miff of a thrown ball.

The Union boys excelled in team work, and played gamely to the end out were outclassed for the day at least.

Savage reached first six times out of seven chances, and made three scores. W. Pidcock also made three. Bilyeu hit safely four times, R. Pidcock three, Hug and Savage twice each. Savage also stole two bases.

### RAIN STOPS FIRST GAME.

Rain stopped the first game at the end of the third inning Thursday. The players and spectators being lrenched to the skin by a heavy downpour. It rained off and on all day but cleared off a little about 3 o'clock and announcement was made a game would be played. Over 200 spectators were present when Umpire Miller called play at 4 o'clock. As base paths, the batter's box and outfield were very muddy. No one felt the first inning and the first three Union batters failed to touch Bilyeu's puzzling curves. Cline or Union was wild giving Marvin and Bauer base on balls, but he was saved by a lucky catch of a fly by Nodine. A drizzling rain started and the game turned into a farce, but was continued in hopes the rain would cease. Instead it came down harder and harder until everybody was satisfied to quit at the end of the third. The downpour prevented good playing and neutralized Bilyeu's pitching, so that on wild throws passed balls, with a lucky Texan squarer mixed in, Union made scores in the second, and another in the third on two short hits. Enterprise batted in a run in the second. The features of the piece of a game were two fine running catches by Pace in center field and a splendid throw to homeplate from right field by Bauer.
