## Anti-Assembly Men To Unite On Dimick

Judge Lowell Urges Concentration  
As Sure Way to Beat  
Bowerman.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell of Pen-  
dleton, one of the brainiest men in  
Oregon and a stalwart Republi-  
can who would honor the state and  
party in any office, was strongly  
urged to come out for governor, but  
refused to be swayed from his origi-  
nal intention of making the race for  
the United States senate two  
years from now.

In an interview in the East Ore-  
gonian the Judge said he believed  
the hope of the anti-assembly forces  
rests in their ability to concentrate  
their efforts upon Judge Grant H.  
Dimick of Oregon City. Judge Lo-  
well says he found the anti-assembly  
sentiment fully as strong in Port-  
land as it is in the other parts of  
the state and he declared with one  
candidate against Bowerman, the lat-  
ter's defeat could be easily be en-  
compassed.

While in Portland the Judge grant-  
ed the following interview concern-  
ing the present political situation  
to the Portland Journal:

"It is not alone a question of as-  
sembly and anti-assembly, it is a  
question of progression against retro-  
gression. It is a question of wheth-  
er the new order of things shall  
continue or the state shall go back to  
the old. I believe that the people of  
Oregon want to remain in the new  
era."

"In my belief the anti-assembly  
forces should concentrate on Grant  
H. Dimick for governor and put him  
in nomination," continued Judge Lo-  
well. "In my belief it is necessary  
for the retention of the new order  
of things political in Oregon to beat  
Jay Bowerman for the Republican  
nomination for governor. It is not  
a question of men. It is a question  
of principle. Jay Bowerman is a  
personal friend of mine. I admire  
the man, but if he were to be put  
in the governor's chair he would  
have a machine built before the end  
of his term that would put the old  
machine clear in the shade."

**Bowerman Machine Man.**  
"Bowerman was raised in Marion  
county. He plays the game as he  
was taught to play it in Marion  
county in the old days. He is a

machine man, and to elect him  
would be to put the assembly on  
the same for a generation to come.  
It is necessary to beat him, there-  
fore, in my opinion, and the only  
way to do it is to concentrate on  
Dimick.

"The spirit of insurgency is in the  
air," continued Judge Lowell. "What  
has been shown us in California, in  
Nevada, Kansas and the other states  
has pointed the way during the  
past weeks, is in the air in Ore-  
gon. This is an insurgent state.  
People here want the new order of  
things. They want to escape from  
the old. And it is well for them  
to do so."

"Therefore, I say that the issue  
here goes beyond the question of  
assembly or anti-assembly. It is a  
question of the insurgent against  
the regular, the new against the old.  
The assembly is trying to take us  
back to the old system. Those op-  
posed to it are fighting that effort."

"Out over the state the sentiment  
is strongly against the assembly,  
and I have been in close touch  
with different sections. The people  
of the state generally do not want  
to retrograde. They want to ad-  
vance."

### Concentration Only Hope.

"But the Bowerman strength is  
a certain and definite strength. It  
is lined up and will stay that way  
until the votes have been cast. To  
defeat this strength it will be nec-  
essary to concentrate. A split vote  
means the nomination of Bowerman,  
and for that reason, believing Mr.  
Dimick to be the strongest of the  
candidates in the field against Bow-  
erman, I urge that a concentrated  
effort be made to nominate him."

"Up in my country they look on  
Dimick as a safe man who would  
make a safe governor. He is  
stronger than the other candidates.  
I have been urged to become a can-  
didate for the nomination for gov-  
ernor. But I do not intend to get  
into the race. I believe it would  
further split up the vote and make  
the nomination of Bowerman just  
that much more certain. Ben Sel-  
ling has been urged to run, but his  
business affairs will not allow it,  
as I understand. Judge Webber  
has also been urged, but I under-  
stand that he has refused to be a  
candidate. But I believe that the  
surest way at this late date, is to  
join hands in helping one candi-  
date and that is what I intend to do,  
I trust, with success."
