TWICE-A-WEEK NEWS RECORD

In announcing last week the
change to be made in the News
Record from a weekly to a twice-a-
week paper, mention was made of
the colored magazine and comic sup-
plement that will be added, begin-
ning with the issue of Saturday, Jan-
uary 16. For fear of misunder-
standing, we wish to state this sup-
plement is not decided on as a per-
manent change. It is in the nature
of an experiment. If our readers do
not consider it an improvement, it
will be dropped after a thorough
trial, but something better will be
added in its place.

Another change or addition that
we know will be an improvement and
that will be permanent is a com-
plete summary of the news of Ore-
gon and the Northwest particularly,
and of the world generally. This
includes a special Washington, D. C.,
letter, and the Portland and Seattle
market reports.

The present News Record is fre-
quently praised for its local news
service. The twice-a-week paper
will be even better in that respect,
as more space will be available for
that purpose.

The biggest single improvement,
however, will be in the county news
service, cramped heretofore for lack
of space. All the news of Joseph,
Lostine, Wallowa, Flora and the
North Country, the Promise Land,
Imaha and the hill country, will be
gathered by a competent staff of re-
porters whose instructions will be to
do all in their power to make their
sections known to the world through
the columns of the News Record.

In short, the ideal of this paper
is to be a mirror of the news of
all Wallowa county, and the editor
will do his utmost to realize that
ideal.

This office is equipped to do the
work. The machinery will in a few
days be connected up with electri-
cal power as well as gasoline, and
with first-class workmen in the shop.
If this prospectus is not lived up to
the fellow who wrote this will be to
blame. This is told so you will know
whom to kick.

As stated last week the price of
the twice-a-week paper will neces-
sarily be increased, but paid in ad-
vance subscriptions at the present
rate will be accepted until after the
changes go into effect.

Proceedings of Board of Equaliza-
tion for Wallowa County, Oregon.
Oct. 20, 1908, to Nov. 18, 1908, in-
clusive.
Board met pursuant to adjourn-
ment, all members present, and ex-
amined matters before it.
Nov. 19, 1908.

In the matter of the assessment for
taxes of real property of the George
Palmer Lumber company, a private
corporation, and of the application
for reduction therein:

The board having considered the
petition and application for reduc-
tion of assessment made by the
petitioner and the evidence in sup-
port thereof, and from the same
finds that the allegations of said
petition and application for a re-
duction are not sustained; that the
assessment of the lands described
in the said petition and application
for a reduction of assessment is
not contrary to law, and that said
assessment is not excessive, and
that the amount at which said
property was assessed is its actual
full cash value, and that said
assessment was fairly made in
good faith; and that the prayer of
the said petition should be denied,
and now being fully advised in the
premises,

It is hereby ordered and adjudged
that the said petition of the said
applicant be and the same hereby
is denied, and that the said
assessment on the lands described
in the said petition be approved
and made the assessment of the
Board of Equalization of Wallowa
county, Oregon, and it is so or-
dered.

In the matter of the assessment for
taxes of real property of The Cross-
sett Timber Co., a private corpora-
tion, and of the application for a
reduction thereon:

Board finds petitioner not unlaw-
fully discriminated against in the
assessment complained of, but that
on the contrary the amount
assessed by the assessor is its
actual full cash value, made in
good faith, and the Board further
finds therefrom that the said pe-
tition shows on its face that the
said lands are actually worth more
than the amount at which they are
assessed, and now found by the
Board to be its actual cash value
and that the said petition does not
pray for an increase of assess-
ment, and that the prayer of said
petition should be denied.
Same order and decree as in Geo.
M. Palmer Lumber Co. petition.
