## To Beautify City Is Ladies Desire

Improvement League Wants Civic House Cleaned and Set To Rights.

The Enterprise Improvement league met at the library room Monday evening instead of at the court house as announced, the band having the court room engaged for that evening.

The committee appointed to confer with the council regarding a clean-up day, reported that the council has appointed Friday, April 15, as such day. It was requested by the league that the ladies of the city co-operate in making the work of the day effective, and that residents be asked to rake the streets in front of their premises, half-way across the road and place trash in piles ready to be removed by the garbage wagon on that day.

The matter of improving the depot grounds was brought up and the board was instructed to confer with the directors of the Commercial club and frame a request to the railroad company.

Announcement was made that A. J. Boehmer had offered to conduct a musical entertainment for the benefit of the league and a committee was appointed to confer with him in regard to the same.

The matter of beautifying the court house grounds was discussed

and a committee was appointed to make inquiries as to what the court expects to do and if the league can assist in the work.

A special meeting will be held in the library room Monday evening, April 11, to hear the report of the musicale committee.

### FARMERS' UNIONS.

A local union of the Farmers Educational and Co-operative Union was organized in this city Saturday by D. C. Kirk, general organizer. There was a good turnout of farmers at the meeting in spite of the stormy day and the new union started with over 15 charter members, to which a number have since been added. C. A. McAlister was elected clerk. A meeting will be held at the court house next Saturday to take in new members.

Hugh Wilson is clerk of the Joseph union. Mr. Kirk will organize a union at Wallowa next Saturday at 1:30 p. m.

## COUNCIL LIFTS LID FROM POOL ROOMS

MAY KEEP OPEN TILL MIDNIGHT AND ON SUNDAY—CALLS CONVENTION.

Receding from its air-tight, padlocked lid position of a month ago, the city council relented, a little Monday night and raised the lid as far as pool rooms are concerned. An ordinance provides that pool rooms close at 10 p. m. and close all day Sunday. W. A. Davis and El Ward, proprietors of a pool room on West Main street, appeared before the council and talked so persuasively that the city fathers gave the boys permission to keep open until midnight and on Sunday.

The council directed Recorder Taggart to issue a call for a mass convention to nominate candidates for city offices. It is found elsewhere in his paper.

The city treasurer was directed to prepare a statement showing the financial condition of the city and send it at the mass convention.

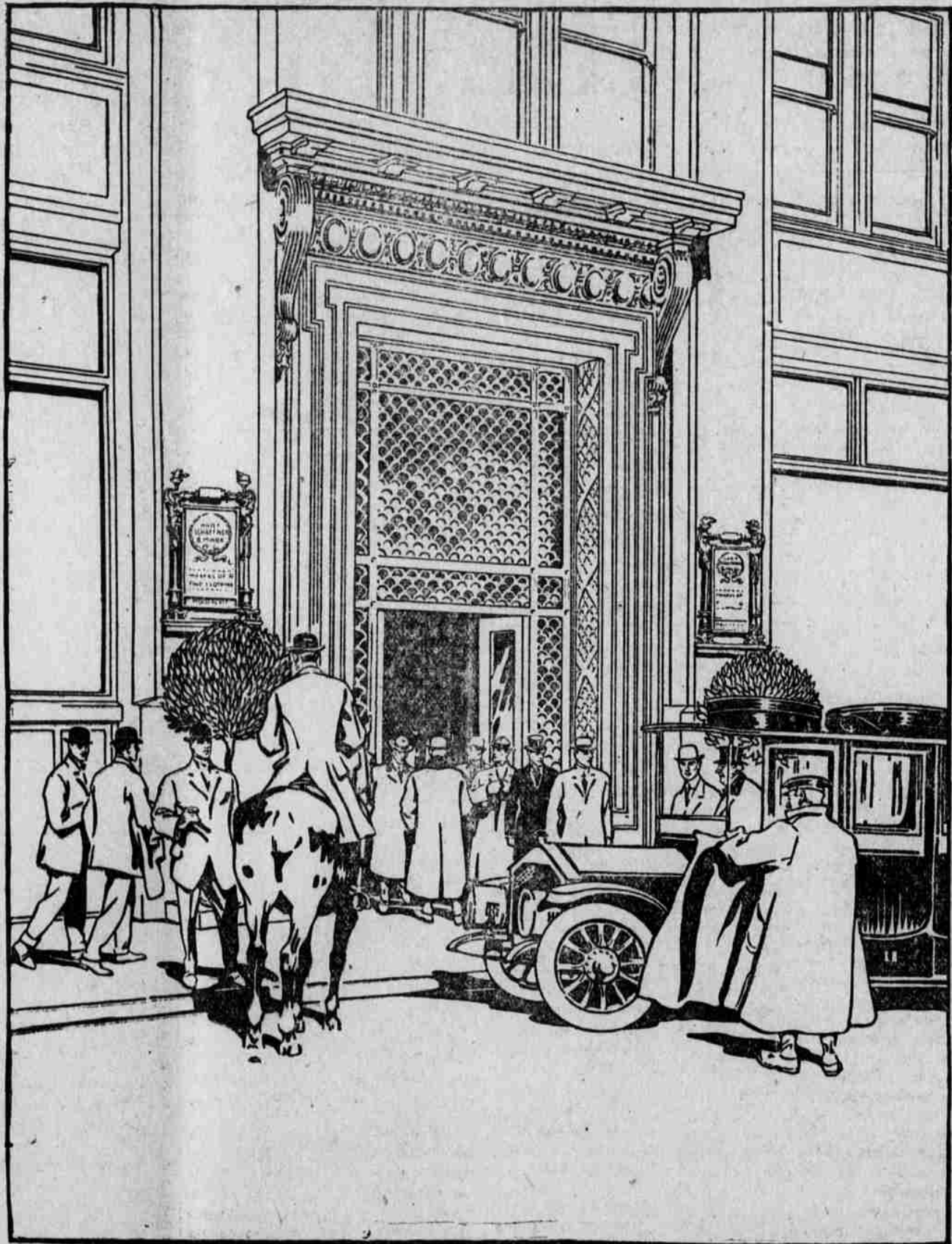
## Friday, April 15 Is Clean-Up Day
