Official Proceedings Of County Court

(Continued from last week.)

In the matter of the proposed road by John McDonald and others:

This matter came on to be heard at this time on report of the Board of County Road Viewers for a second reading as provided by law, and said report of the Board of County Road Viewers having been now publicly read in open court, and it appearing to the Court that said board of County Road Viewers report favorably thereon and recommend that said proposed road be established as a county road and be declared a public highway of Wallowa County, Oregon, and all the files and records of said proceedings having been submitted to the District Attorney, who has advised this Court as to the legality of said proceedings, and after the Court fully considered the matter,

It is hereby considered and ordered that said proposed road be and the same be hereby continued.

In the matter of the proposed road petitioned for by O. F. Mays and others:

Now, at this time the Court considers the matter of allowing the proposed road petitioned for by O. F. Mays and others, and it appearing to the Court that the District Attorney has reported favorably thereon and that all damages have been paid, and after the Court fully considering the same,

It is hereby considered and ordered that said road be allowed and opened for public travel according to survey thereof.

In the matter of the proposed road petitioned for by G. F. Lindley and others:

Now, at this time the Court considers the matter of allowing the proposed road petitioned for by G. F. Lindley and others, and it appearing to the Court that the District Attorney has reported favorably thereon and that all damages have been paid, and after the Court fully considering the same,

It is hereby considered and ordered that said road be allowed and opened for public travel according to survey thereof.

In the matter of the proposed road petitioned for by John Anthony and others:

Now on this day this matter came on to be heard on the report of the County Road Viewers for a second reading as provided by law, said report being in words as follows, to-wit:

To the Honorable County Court: We, the undersigned Board of County Road Viewers, appointed by the Honorable Court, to view, survey and lay out a county road as prayed for in the petition of John Anthony and others, beg leave to report: That pursuant to said order we met at the beginning of the proposed road on the 7th day of June, 1910, the same being the time and place fixed by said order for the meeting of the undersigned Board of County Road Viewers, and took to our assistance Joe Clay and P. B. Bankhead as chainbearer, and Geo. W. Buchanan as marker, and proceeded to view, survey and lay out said road as prayed for in said petition, as near as in our opinion a good road can be made at a reasonable expense, taking in

to consideration the utility, convenience and inconvenience and expense which will result to individuals as well as the public, if such road shall be established and opened.

The said road was surveyed under our directions, and the same was conspicuously marked throughout, the corners and distances thereon noted, and all trees on the line of said road were marked on each of the sides thereof corresponding with the direction of said road, with three notches cut through the bark and one inch into the wood, and all trees adjacent to the said line of said road were plainly blazed on the side facing said road.

The beginning and termination of said road and the termination of each time and intermediate points have been marked in the manner provided by law, as will more fully appear by the certified return of the survey of said road, which is hereunto attached and made a part of this report.

That in our opinion the said proposed road should be established for the following reasons:

It is needed by the traveling public and by settlers living adjacent to the proposed road, being for them the most practical and much the shortest distance to the railroad and to a postoffice.

No damages allowed.

We consider that the lands of the George Palmer Lumber company, through which the proposed road passes, will be rendered no less valuable by reason of the establishment of the road.
