It was thought yesterday that Mrs. McNeal could not survive Divide, J. O. Kiddle of Loctine, D. through the night, but she is reported some better at this writing. Dr. Baker of Joseph, Harry Heffling of Glimore of Flora waited on the little boy of E. A. Hack's that died a few days ago and the doctor contracted the disease himself and has been confined to his home since.

E. A. Hack has been in a critical condition himself with the disease Next Wednesday is the last day for several days and after Dr. Gilmore was confined to his home he phoned to Anatone for a doctor to come at once. The doctor arrived night before last and stayed till yesterday morning, and Mr. Hack is reported improving. Before the doctor got home he received a telephone to come back, but he had patients he was compelled to visit, so he refused the call and insisted that the board of health at Entirprise be informed at once and have the sick and all who had been exrosed quarantined at once. A doctor has been called from Wallowa, and is expected to arrive this morning by 10 o'clock.

IS BOON TO ALL RESIDENTS OF GROUSE AND GARDEN OF EDEN COUNTRIES.

Grouse, Sept. 6.-The people of the Grouse country on both sides of the state line between the Grande Ronde river and the Elue Mountains are wonderfully pleased over the completion of the new steel bridge at Troy.

They say many congratulations are due the county commissioners for the interest they have taken in the welfare of our people, and a number of them met the honorable county court at Troy Saturday and served a nice picnic dinner which was enjoyed by all present.

The foreman of the party putting up the bridge is spoken of in the highest terms of respect. The pridge crew of nine men have made many friends here and are highly esteemed as gentlemen. We are sorry that two of the party were taken sick at the close of the work. The crew were all served a fine dinner at Grouse Sunday while enroute to Lewiston.

The grist mill at Troy is nearing completion, and D. A. Silver has a new dwelling house well on the way. Troy is a natural center from all points west and north of the river and will in the near future be a place of note. At present the public roads are not in a condition to warrant a rapid improvement. Like in all other new countries the first roads opened up are made for the quickest and cheapest route regardless of the steepness and other in-

conveniences The citizens of the Grouse country don't want to ask any more favors of the county court than are absolutely necessary, but under the circumstances we can't well avoid asking a new road to be laid out from Troy to the top of the hill hear E.
