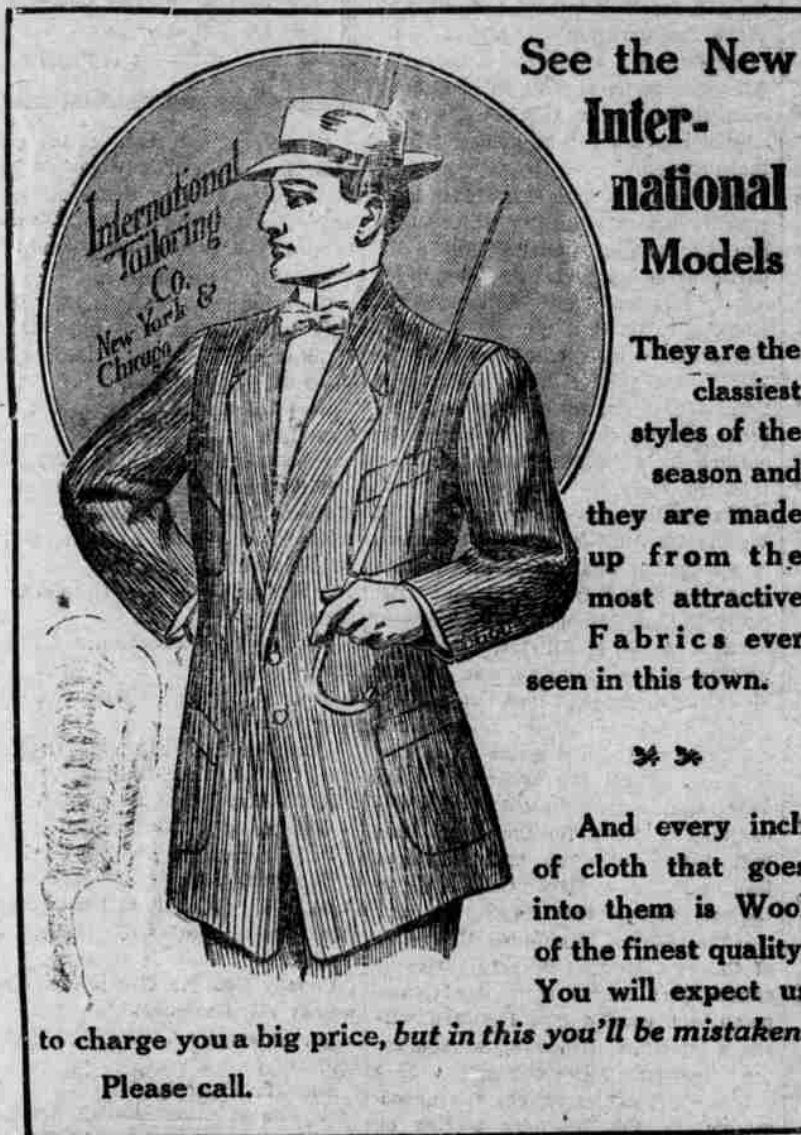

Fair Notes.

M. L. Harris had on display his interesting collection of coins, 60 in number, which includes many foreign pieces, as well as a number of rare and valuable United States coins. One of these coins is 203 years old.

G. C. Clark also showed a number of coins, a tea chest of exquisite workmanship which had been in the Clark family over 150 years, and a miniature case over 100 years old. A silver spoon which had been in the Kuhn family for 80 years was also in the exhibit.

In the needlework department was a vest made by F. S. Johnson's mother over 60 years ago, in Missouri, and worn by his father on their wedding day. The needlework is as perfect as the machine work of today.

A quilt made by Grandma Martin, aged 81 years, of Lost Prairie, was much admired and received a blue ribbon.

Some youthful seamstresses also deserve mention: Kattie Conley, little daughter of J. M. Conley, of Flora, displayed a pretty crazy quilt, and Ruby Lutz is a sofa pillow made when she was 5 years old.

Dale M. Estes showed some fine animals grown on his ranch below Troy.

An eight months old cinnamon bear belonging to Edgar Garrett attracted much attention. It was captured on Little Salmon, 20 miles above Troy, six months ago, the mother and another cub being killed at the time of its capture.

R. L. Utz of Grouse Flat exhibited some good White Dent corn which matured at 90 days. He had 10 acres in this year, and next year expects to plant more.

J. Q. Connally, who has crossed the Rockies 26 times, pronounces the North Country the easiest country to make a living in of any he has ever struck, and that statement was backed up by the splendid specimens and great variety of fruit, grain and vegetables.

Five automobiles from Enterprise and one from Lostine made the Flora streets quite lively. As a compliment from the Enterprise men, the editors of the North Country were given automobile rides, Commissioner Sam Litch and F. I. Vegere running their machines, until all were given a treat which was much enjoyed and appreciated.

EXHIBITS FOR FAIR ARE POURING IN

LARGEST SHOWING OF LIVE
STOCK EVER HELD IN THE
COUNTY.

Exhibits to the county fair began arriving Thursday, and up to date the city and the fair grounds are flooded with the products of the soil, the products of the dairy, of the stock farm, the fruit farm, and the handwork of both women and men.

Additional box stalls may be built for the "overflow" of live stock. Ample room for other exhibits was provided from the beginning, and this was well, owing to the hearty response of Willows county residents with various exhibits.

Beginning Thursday, scarcely a day passed that some stock grower or rancher did not bring in something or make arrangement to bring in something for the fair.

Mr. Blanchard of Hotel Enterprise, who has installed a large dining room and lunch counter, supplemented by an up-to-date kitchen on the grounds. Concessions to outsiders for similar stands also have been let. Cane racks, shooting galleries, and that class of amusement is well represented. The races are filled and the various contests have attracted a good, live number of contestants from over the county. The contest between the girls under 18 years of age, as to which one can make and bake a pan of biscuits the quickest, is attracting considerable attention. Both the making and the baking must be done before the public.

All told the fair is replete with amusement features. Concessions have been granted to individuals and to companies, and the amusement feature is a gala one for the visitor.
