## THE CAUSE OF IT.

More towns die for want of confidence on the part of the business men and lack of public spirit than any other cause, says a floating editorial. When a man in search of a home or a business location goes into a town and finds everything brim full of hope and enthusiasm of the prospects of the place and all earnestly at work to build up, he soon finds, he soon becomes imbued with the same spirit and as a result he drives down stakes and goes to work with the same interest. When, however, he goes to a town where everyone expresses doubt and apprehension for the future prosperity of the place, moping about, indulging in mournful complaints, he naturally feels that it is no place for him and he at once shakes the dust of the place from his feet while he pulls out with all possible speed for some other location. Consequently try to make a live, enterprising town of the one in which you live. When you are working for your town you are accomplishing all the more for yourself.

## A PROPER MOVEMENT.

A movement is on foot by the Illinois Society of Medford, this state, to have the remains of former United States Senator Edward Dickinson Baker exhumed from their present burial place near San Francisco and removed to Salem, Oregon. Baker,

a former Illinoisan, was for a long time a resident of the state of California, and the movement to remove the remains to Oregon is proposed by the society as being fitting that his bones should find a final resting place within the borders of state the people of which recognized his worth sufficiently to send him to the senate. Inasmuch as our own county and city were named after Col. Baker, the hero of Ball's Bluff, and whose death occurred in the service of his country, it would be befitting for Baker people to render such assistance as possible in furthering the efforts of the Illinois Society of Medford in its laudable undertaking.—Baker Democrat.

The \$7,000,000 Fifth Avenue home of ex-Senator William A. Clark of Montana, has been completed, after eight years of work. It is to be the costliest residence ever built in America. The taxes assessed on it by New York, amount to more than \$200 a day. The mansion contains 121 rooms, thirty-one baths and four picture galleries. No building in the world, according to experts who have inspected the interior, carries so much bronze as has been worked into this mansion. Although the best architects and decorators in this country were employed, Senator Clark himself designed much of the interior, as well as the exterior of the mansion. The building contains one of the largest pipe organs in the world, which was installed at a cost of \$300,000. There are \$2,000,000 worth of pictures and \$500,000 worth of rugs.

Pacific Coast fisheries yielded \$39,706,490 in 1910. Alaska led with \$14,820,217, and Washington came second with \$10,171,929. This summary embraces all branches of the industry, including canned salmon, fresh and cured halibut, salted and dried salmon, codfish, oysters, clams, crabs, shrimps and fur seals. This showing gives some idea of the growing importance of an industry which has come up from practically nothing, in the past ten years.

La Grande, Union, Baker and Elgin propose to organize a four-town amateur baseball league for the coming season. Grant Hughes will manage the La Grande team if sufficient support is promised by the business men of that city. It is said that La Grande business men will put up the necessary funds provided every team in the league is willing to post a \$200 forfeit that will revert back to the club posting it should the stipulations be adhered to. Hughes has been working in the Masterson blacksmith shop at La Grande all winter, and is said to be a good man, both as a player and as manager.
