S. marines, and was stationed at the Newport training station.

Young Fairchild is survived by his parents, now in this city, two sisters, Mrs. Viola Wade, of Sheridan, Ore., and Mrs. George Janzler, of Glendale, and by one brother, Glenn Fairchild, of Grass Valley, Ore.

The funeral will be held in this city at Hall's chapel this afternoon at 2 o'clock, the services being private on account of the recent proclamation of the mayor.

MORE BOOZE PEDDLERS  
TAKEN NEAR ROSEBURG

Two more bootleggers, with a carload of booze, met their Waterloo this morning, as they were arrested at the second railroad crossing south of town by Sheriff Quine, says the Friday issue of the Roseburg Review. The men were putting all speed possible on the car, for they had safely passed Canyonville and had hopes of getting through Roseburg without detection. About 100 bottles of liquor were piled loosely in the car and were of the Sunnybrook vintage, from Hornbrook.

The men gave their names as Peter Berogowsky, of Portland, and Mike Yakovenka, of San Francisco. They admitted they were trying to unlawfully transport liquor through the state and put up a plea to Sheriff Quine to let them free, but without effect. They claimed they had got the liquor from San Francisco and were taking it to Portland to sell.

The two men were taken before Justice of the Peace Riddle and Yakovenka entered a plea of guilty. His companion, Berogowsky, claimed that he was not guilty and had no knowledge that the booze was in the car. He said he had gone to California with the other man only on a trip and thought that he was also taking a little vacation. As this was an old story, which is being told to the officers quite often lately, District Attorney Neuner decided to try the case and Berogowsky was convicted. A fine of \$100 was imposed upon him and in default of payment 50 days in jail.

Yakovenka was sentenced to a \$250 or 125 days in jail. As neither man could pay the fine, District Attorney Neuner told them that one would be released if he could raise money to pay the fines, as the jail now has a good many prisoners and it is an expense on the county to continue feeding them.

Salt Lake City, Oct. 19.—An extensive campaign against coyotes, wolves, wild cats and other predatory animals has been decided upon by the Utah state livestock board, and the government has promised to cooperate. Half of these are employed by the state and the others by the federal government.
