DOCTORS SAY "FLU" HAS AGAIN APPEARED

As there are a number of new cases of influenza in the city, the people are cautioned against crowding and visiting about in any unnecessary manner. There is no desire on the part of the city officials to close the city up again, and such action will not be necessary if all the people will watch themselves all the time.

Some children have been sent home from school during the week with what appeared to be a cold, which later proved to be influenza in a very severe form. The parents of children suffering with colds have been requested and instructed to keep such children at home until they have completely recovered, and thus avoid exposing the whole student body, but some parents seem to have little regard for the welfare of others as to allow their infected children to attend school in spite of the warning of the danger to the whole community.

It is much better for one child to miss a few days of school than to expose the whole community, and make it necessary to close the schools again and compel all the children to miss several weeks of school which they will have to make up later on.

Mrs. Day Badly Bruised—Mrs. Elmer Day, who was injured by a runaway horse on the street Sunday morning, is still confined to her bed. Mrs. Day's little daughter was in the path of the horse and Mrs. Day in rescuing the little girl was run down and severely bruised.

Young DeVarila was gassed early in the spring and was sent home for a time, returning to France in July. Details are lacking as to his actual condition.

Helms is pastor of the Morgan Memorial in Boston, the largest institutional church in America.
