CONVENTION PURITY.

Col. B. F. Alley in Florence West: Apart from the pressing and more or less transitory political issues of the hour, nothing is now so widely or deeply interesting to the people of every free community as the purity of conventions. Manipulations by tricksters against primaries and conventions have dared so much of late—have grown to such enormous proportions and produced consequences so far reaching—that the people everywhere realize that the contest between it and the political corruption that follows, is a life and death struggle.

If men are able to successfully manipulate the system of primaries and conventions so far as to dictate public offices and public policies, divert the revenues of the community into their hands for personal, selfish and mercenary ends, and to do so year in and year out, without fear of being turned down, is popular government a failure?

The fight against this system of "managing" primaries and conventions is beginning to be earnest, resourceful and effective.

Independent organized plans of the voters have arisen with the self-assured errand of chastising those corrupt methods of their own erstwhile bosses. We predict that the force of this protest against these unpatriotic methods will be felt in the coming gatherings to nominate officers.

There is no principle of a free government more important than that the elected servants of the people, nor those who want to be elected, nor the bosses of any town or city, shall not themselves prepare the list of delegates through which any course of action must be pronounced upon for the people. It is within the power of good citizens to enforce honest primary elections, and it requires only a small number of men in each precinct to make their will effective.

INDIAN EDUCATION.

After numerous changes in the management, the Chemawa Indian school seems to be at last under a good superintendent. Mr. Potter seems to have the qualifications necessary for the work at this large and important government training school.

Mr. Potter is still a young man though eleven years in the Indian service. He has executive ability, is an educator and disciplinarian combined. Besides he has the happy faculty of recognizing the children under his care as his equals and not as creatures beneath him. He also issues all the rations.

The Chemawa school is one of the most successful industrial experiments at educating children of Indian parentage to the trades and farming. It now employs about thirty persons and has at times in the year three hundred boys and girls in its care.

Now that the Democratic editor of the Republican paper has become a Republican, it would be in order for the editor of the Salem Populist paper to come over too. Let us labor to a single end, gentlemen, the good of our country.

REVENUE AND GOLD.

THE JOURNAL has always maintained with James G. Blaine that the questions of revenue and finance were inseparable. The gold that goes out of our country as balance of trade is not all the drain upon our gold. The gold that goes to pay interest on bonds and mortgages owned by foreigners is a still larger drain on our gold.

To overcome this our country must not only have a protective tariff but must make all duties on foreign imports payable in gold. If Europeans and importers want to discredit all money but gold they should pay into the national treasury nothing but gold. That would restore to our country under a protective tariff some of the gold drawn out by foreign mortgage holders.

That would be some protection. If we could add to that genuine bimetalism and repeal the specific contract law we would begin to see daylight in a few years, but never without these things, or any one of them.

PULLING THE STRING.

The New York chamber of commerce has sent out orders that only single standard men are to be elected delegates to the Republican and Democratic national conventions. Was ever political impudence carried farther?

The chamber of commerce is nothing but the organized bankers of Wall street. They are pulling the string on the country bankers. The country bankers pull the string on the business man, produce buyer and manufacturer who are dependent upon them for credit and ratings.

The primary elements of wealth are labor and products out of the soil. These products are converted into money by the merchant and middleman. Their surplus are deposited with the banker, who is about the third factor in the production of wealth. Yet the third factor is pulling the political string on all the rest.

NORMAL SCHOOLS.

The so-called normal schools of this state are little better than common schools. They are not normal schools in fact. They are merely high schools that have been located at certain towns either for political reasons or to benefit the town in which they are located.—Salem post.

Has Mr. Fletcher, of the Post, ever visited these schools? Does he know that they are little better than common schools? We have been at the Monmouth school several times and know that it is about as good as any college in the state, except Eugene university. It is especially devoted to training teachers and preparing them for their work. It has prepared hundreds of excellent teachers. Still we do not believe the taxpayers of the state should any longer be asked to support even the two normal schools they have been supporting.

DEMOCRATS MUST.

Democrats must declare for the single gold standard. That is the decree of Chairman Harrity of the Democratic national committee. Must is a hard word. But when the national committee says so the six or seven millions Democrats know what they must do.

Who is Harrity? Harrity is the man who sent out the telegrams to the close and doubtful states in 1892: "If you want to help Cleveland, vote for the Weaver electors." Those were the words posted on handbills on election day all over Oregon four years ago.

Democrats obeyed orders then and they will again. They elected Pierce presidential elector in Oregon. They elected presidential electors in other states by fusion with the Populists. This year they must declare for Wall street and the single gold standard.

SOME SOUND SENTIMENTS.

Every County Has as Much Right to a Normal School as Two Counties.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—As coming events cast their shadows before the adumbrage of the next Oregon legislature is fairly upon us, and candidates names are in the wind. Should not measures, rather than men, chiefly concern us? We have been too much in the power of the political boss who has both devised the measures and selected the men trusting to the poor silly sheep to do the voting. An intelligent public should have well-defined measures, and then select the right men to carry out their measures. It is generally agreed that there should be a lopping off of useless and expensive commissions and a close economy in necessary expenditures, but it is useless to expect these reforms unless we elect the men who from their known character may be relied upon to carry them out.

One of the abuses that need correction is the springing up of schools all over the state that are supported at public expense for the profit of a few. If our public school system was sufficiently established there would not be such serious objection, but it is unfair for the country farmer to be taxed for the higher education of a few, while in many a district the school fund allows him the benefit of only three months school in each year. Every district in the state ought to have no less than six months school at public expense, and to this end the apportionment to each district should be raised from \$50 to \$100 in addition to the per capita apportionment. Let the public school be liberally sustained, and if anybody wants better education than the public school affords let him get it at his own expense.
