AN ESTATE SETTLED.—In the matter of the guardianship of Joseph A. Jackson, minor heir of J. B. Jackson, with Mary Jackson as guardian, the final account was filed with the county clerk yesterday by P. H. D'Arcy, attorney. The said account cites that the said minor attained his majority on the 14th day of February, 1896, and also incorporates a prayer for the release and discharge of the above named guardian and for the exoneration of her bondsmen. Under the title of exhibits, the account shows the receipts to be \$2,211.41; expenditures, \$517.44; amount deducted for widow's share, \$1,129.32; amount coming to Jos. A. Jackson, \$225.87; amount paid for Joseph Jackson, \$601; amount due guardian from minor over and above amount received from his share, \$375. The above account was ordered allowed by the court.

ESCAPED ASYLUM PATIENTS.

John Bucher is Found Dead and J. L. Coffin Still at Large.

John Bucher, the patient who escaped from a ward in the asylum infirmary on Wednesday, March 11, was found dead yesterday afternoon, on the bank of Pudding river, five miles east of Salem. The body was discovered by R. L. Swartz's little son, Ivan, and his friend, a Townsend boy. They spread the alarm and as soon as possible the asylum authorities sent out and identified the body. Coroner Clough was apprized of the facts, and after due investigation it was decided that no inquest was necessary. The body was brought to the asylum and prepared for burial or shipment, as may become necessary. Bucher was aged about 46 years, whose home was at Hillsdale, a short distance west of Portland, and who was committed from Multnomah county, November 26, 1895, it being his first commitment. His dementia was said to have been caused by being continuously stooped several hours at a time laying tile. He was said to be suicidal.

J. L. Coffin, the patient from Union county, who escaped in a nude condition from the asylum several days ago, has not yet been captured. He broke out of his ward by letting himself down on a rope made of clothing. He is being diligently looked for by officers of the institution. He is said to be harmless, and probably secretes himself during the day, as he has only a blanket with him.

Morphine Fiend in Trouble.

Chief of Police Dilley returned from Oregon City on the local this morning with Elmer Green, who is wanted here to answer to the charge of larceny from a dwelling. The theft for which Green is arrested, was committed last February, and knowing a warrant was out for his arrest, he immediately left town. Chief Dilley located his man at Tacoma recently and had Sheriff E. C. Maddock, of Clackamas county, who was in Tacoma at the time, arrest the man and bring him to Oregon City where Chief Dilley found him this morning. Green is a morphine fiend and like others of his type will steal anything that may be converted into money with which to satisfy his cravings. As this is not the first time he has committed similar offenses, he will probably be severely dealt with this time.
