Twenty-Eight Killed and Fifty Injured.

A MILLION DOLLAR LOSS

Forty Indians Reported Killed in a Nebraska Storm.

STATE NEWS.

The Polk county pioneers meet June 24.

May 23rd will be a gala day in Independence.

There will be no joint canvass in Benton county.

The Springfield mill has its own electric light plant.

The Crook county man, on trial for murder has been acquitted.

Cook county pays \$146 to deliver a patient to the asylum at Salem.

The ladies band of Corvallis have been engaged to play at Independence on July Fourth.

Pendleton wheelmen will contest for a \$25-prize from the latter place to the reservation, a distance of ten miles.

The mill at Gardner has shut down and the mill is undergoing an overhauling.

R. V. Jackson, a school teacher of Oregon City who forged two school orders amounting to \$70 has been captured.

The people of Ashland are preparing to celebrate the fourth of July in grand style.

Union county pioneers hold a meeting at Cove on June 25th. A basket picnic and speeches are prominent features of the day.

Three train loads of cattle will be shipped out of Lane county in a day or two. Mr. Cornelius, a cattle-buyer, will ship 1600 on the 21st.

Thomas Sturgill of Baker City, was caught under a heavy cave-off, while engaged in placer mining at Sturgill Bar, on Snake river and killed.

The first Chinese laborer, who returned to China under the new registration law landed in Portland this week without any apparent trouble.

The Medford business college was burned to the ground Saturday night. The cause was a student upsetting a lamp, from which the flames immediately spread.

Parrish Metzker, of Baker City, was struck by an O. R. & N. train and thrown high into the air. He was picked up unconscious. He was not dangerously hurt.

C. J. Curtis, editor of the Weekly Herold, of Astoria, and H. W. Weeks, candidate for recorder on the Populist ticket, engaged in a fist encounter, in which Curtis came out second best.

The interest of Pendleton's debt amounts to \$100 per month, and consists of \$70,000 bonded not including a school district, indebtedness of at least \$20,000, and an estimated floating debt of \$6000.

Democrats and Populists have combined on W. C. Edwards as candidate for joint senator from Coos, Curry and Josephine, and W. H. Flanagan as candidate for representative from Josephine. Edwards was the Populist selection, and Flanagan the Democratic.

A freak of nature in the shape of a calf is being exhibited in Eugene by R. J. Crow, of Junction. It was born and was dead when found. Its head is the largest part of its body and in shape it resembles a seal more than any other animal. Mr. Crow will have it mounted.
