The irrigation district authorized \$75,000. The remaining \$20,000 will be sold by the directorate as the need for them arises.

In the matter of the petition of the Board of Directors of Dee Irrigation District for the judicial examination and judgment of the Circuit Court as to the regularity and legality of certain proceedings relating to the organization of said District, and to the issuance of its bonds.

In the Name of the State of Oregon: You and each of you are hereby notified that the Board of Directors of Dee Irrigation District has, by its petition filed with the Clerk of this Court, commenced proceedings in said Court praying for the judicial examination and judgment of said Court as to the regularity and legality of each and every of the acts and proceedings of the original petitioners for said District, of the County Court of Hood River County, Oregon, and of the Board of Directors of said District, taken and had in connection with the organization of said District, and the authorization and issuance of its bonds in the maximum amount of \$65,000.00, and any other matters or proceedings affecting the legality or validity of said District or of its said bonds, that all of the same may be approved and confirmed and that said District and its said bonds may be adjudged and decreed to be legal and valid.

You are required to appear and answer said petition, or otherwise plead to the same, and contest the validity of said proceeding or of any of the acts or things therein enumerated before the expiration of ten days after the full publication of this notice, to-wit, on or before January 21, 1923; and if you fail so to do, for want thereof, said petitioners will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in said petition.
