## Old Arkansas Gives 65,000 Majority

For Free Coinage of Silver at 16 to 1.

### MORE THAN DOUBLE MAJORITY

The Battle Fought On Financial Lines.

### OLD WAR ISSUES ARE BURIED.

The Republicans Were for the Gold Standard.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 8.—Carroll Armstrong, chairman of the Democratic state central committee, says the indications are that there were 165,000 votes cast in yesterday's election. The combined vote of the opposition reached 50,000, giving a majority of 65,000 for the Democratic ticket. The campaign was fought on financial lines, the Democrats standing for free silver, Republicans for the gold standard. This is double the majority the Democrats received in the elections two and four years ago.

#### REPORTS LAST NIGHT.

The city of Helena gives the Democratic ticket a large majority, although Remmel (Rep.) for governor ran far ahead of the Republican ticket. In Lafayette county every Democrat is elected. The Democratic majority in Franklin is from 700 to 800. The estimated Democratic majority in Miller county is 800, although one county officer is in doubt. Woodruff county is considered safe for the Democratic ticket.

Many negroes scratched the ticket and voted for Jones for governor. Johnson county gives a large majority for the Democratic ticket. Jackson county elects the entire Democratic local ticket and the county votes favorably on license. In Lenoce, the Democrats win easily. White county is claimed for Jones by about 100. Sharp county goes Democratic by 17,000 majority.

There were but two full tickets in the field, Democratic and Republican the Populists contenting themselves with a candidate for governor. General Jones and Mr. Remmel, the Republican candidate made an active canvass of the state, but Files, the Populist nominee, made no speeches. Additional returns received up to noon indicate that Colonel Dan. W. Jones and the remainder of the Democratic state ticket won by 65,000 or 70,000. This beats all former records in Arkansas. Estimated that 180,000 votes were polled. It is generally conceded that Remmel, Republican, will have about 40,000. Files, Populist, 45,000, Miller, Prohibition, 2,000. At most, these three candidates have received not over 60,000. This would leave Jones with 64,000 majority over all. Over 13,000 more than it was claimed he would get prior to the election. Two years ago when Governor Clarke was elected 126,000 votes were polled.

#### AN UNION FOR SILVER.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—An address was issued today from Populist headquarters. Bryan and Watson, it declares, are the "true co-operative ticket for the silver votes of all parties." It is pointed out that the People's party forced the Democratic party to turn down the Cleveland administration and adopt the principles of the People's party and as the action of the Democratic party in future is uncertain, all citizens who believe in the government, as administered by Jefferson, Jackson and Lincoln, are urged to uphold and strengthen the People's party. The address closes with an appeal for a contribution, of one dollar, to the campaign fund from every individual able and willing to contribute.

FUSION IN TEXAS.  
FORTH WORTH, Tex., Sept. 8.—The state Republican convention met this afternoon with a larger attendance than any convention of the party ever held in Texas. Chairman Grant spoke advocating harmony and said, if it prevailed, Texas was in reach of the Republican party. N. W. Cuney, a negro delegate from Galveston, was elected temporary chairman.

At a caucus, this morning, it was determined to fuse with the Populists and sound money Democrats on the following basis: Republicans to cast their vote for the Populist state ticket and an electoral ticket composed of eight Republicans, four Populists and three sound money Democrats to be put up. It is claimed this will give the Populists the state government and defeat the Bryan electors.

#### JONES IS SURPRISED.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—Chairman Jones of the Democratic committee in speaking of the Arkansas election today said: "I expected a majority of about 40,000 but was entirely unprepared for what seems to be the result. I attribute the tremendous majority to the interest in bimetalism. The result in Arkansas shows what may be expected throughout the entire south and west, just as the result in Vermont foreshadowed the result in the New England states."

#### FUSION IN MISSOURI.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 8.—The Democratic state central committee, by a unanimous vote decided this afternoon to fuse with the Populists. It is probable the electoral ticket will consist of 13 Democrats and four Populists.

#### General Black Declines.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—General John C. Black will probably issue a letter tomorrow declining the nomination for governor by the gold standard Democrats. The committees will select Judge Thomas A. Moran, William S. Forman or Henry Raab as candidate.

#### Mercantile Failure.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Sept. 8.—The William J. Little, mercantile company, the oldest and largest wholesale and retail establishment in this city closed its doors this morning. Liabilities are placed at \$80,000. Assets exceed that amount several thousand dollars.

#### Made Bishop.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 8.—Rev. Edward J. O'Dea was today consecrated bishop of Washington, consecrator was Archbishop Gross, Metropolitan of ecclesiastical province, assisted by Bishops Gloreau, Brondel and Leming. About 100 priests from Oregon and Washington were present.

#### Mexican Indian Scare.

HERMOSILLO, Mexico, Sept. 8.—There is much uneasiness felt throughout the western part of this state over the threatened outbreak of the Yaqui Indians. Large numbers of the peaceable Indians have quit their work.

#### Failure.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 8.—The Lockwood Manufacturing Company, manufacturers of patent feeding boxes, made an assignment. The company has \$100,000 capital. They have been doing business forty years.

#### Leader Captured.

CAPE TOWN, Sept. 8.—A dispatch from Umntal announces that Chief Makonla, the great leader of the insurgent Mashonas, has been captured in a cave at his stronghold.

#### A Twenty-five Mile Race.

DENVER, Sept. 8.—There were 204 entries in the Labor-day 25-mile road race and 190 starters. Nat M. Gilman won the race.

## FOREIGN NEWS NOTES

### A Combination Against Old England.

### THE PHILIPPINE REVOLT.

### The American Refugees Demanding Their Release.

### Against England.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 8.—Novoe Vremya made the important statement yesterday that the czar's tour shows that Berlin and Vienna, as well as Paris and St. Petersburg, are conscious of the necessity of common action by the powers to defeat the political designs of Great Britain which, it is added, are clearly displayed in recent events in Turkey. The article deals with the intimation that the British press based considerable hope for the success of Great Britain's policy on the death of Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky, the Russian minister of foreign affairs, who is understood to have been a strong opponent of England.

#### A Revolt.

MADRID, Sept. 8.—The dispatch to the Imperial from Hong Kong, says that 1,000 insurgents, commanded by a half-breed named Santollano, have invaded Sanisidro, in the province of Neva Eclpa, island of Luzon, the largest of the Philippine group, and have imprisoned the governor and his secretary and other officials, and committed many outrages. A dispatch from General Blanco, governor-general of the Philippines, announces the discovery of a fresh conspiracy against the Spanish government. He says the plot is widespread in its ramifications. The first reinforcements have arrived at the Philippine islands from the Mindanao islands.

#### The Armenian Refugees.

MARSEILLES, Sept. 8.—The Armenians who recently arrived from Constantinople on La Grande, after having surrendered to Sir Edward Vincent, one of the directors of the Ottoman bank, after attacking and holding that building for a night, and who were arrested on landing here, have sent a collective note to the minister of the interior demanding their release on the ground that the sultan promised them life and liberty if they surrendered. They expect to sail shortly for New York.

#### Hamonds Successor.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 8.—Harry H. Webb, a son of C. C. Webb, who owns a large part of the Shasta valley, in Siskiyou county, has been engaged by the Chartered Company of South Africa to take charge of the Consolidated Gold Fields Company's interests at Johannesburg as consulting engineer, the position until recently filled by John Hays Hammond.

#### A Bomb in a Marble Yard.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—About 12 o'clock last night an unknown man threw a clumsily constructed bomb into the premises of Farmer & Brindley, the marble masons and sculptors, of 63 Westminster Bridge road. No damage was done. The police are investigating. It is believed to be the result of spite of a discharged employe.

#### The Khalifa Dead.

ROME, Sept. 8.—A dispatch from Kassala to the Tribune mentions a doubtful rumor that is in circulation there that the Khalifa Abdul, the leader of the dervishes and governor of the Soudan, is dead at Khartoum.

#### Troops for the Philippines.

MADRID, Sept. 8.—The cabinet has decided to send a battalion of marines to the Philippine islands.

## IN SOUTHERN OREGON.

Big Bryan Club and Great Enthusiasm at Gold Hill.

GOLD HILL, Sept. 8.—A Bryan silver club was organized here Saturday evening with 78 members enrolled. Geo. R. Hammersley was elected president and Hon. J. J. Houck, secretary. It was the most enthusiastic political gathering known in the history of local politics. The meeting was held in the school house and the seating capacity of the spacious building was insufficient to accommodate the throng who had assembled to hear the Hon. William Colvig, of Jacksonville, discuss the financial issue from a free silver standpoint.

Mr. Colvig's address was a brilliant effort and frequently evoked storms of applause. His incessant firing at the enemy's stronghold so badly demolished their weak fortification and so completely exposed their false position that the audience soon became convinced that the Republican's idea of finance, was a farce, a fraud and a failure.

Mark Hubbard heretofore prominent in the councils of local Republican politics was elected vice-president of the club.

#### STATE NEWS.

At Portland a marriage license was issued to Asa Perkins, aged 72 and Mrs. Mary Bybee, aged 45.
