VOICE FROM OREGON.

A Republican Deplores His Party's Policy.

MUST BEFRIEND SILVER.

Thomas B. Reed, He Believes, is a Goldite.

SPokane, Sept. 10

J. B. Montgomery, of Portland, passed through Spokane yesterday afternoon on his way home after a week's sojourn at Albany Falls.

Very good, indeed. I met Mr. Higgins and your postmaster, Mr. Mallon, when I arrived. They had good luck. Besides supplying the household with trout, they took home a fine basket.

"How does the political situation look to you?" "Well, I am sorry to say, not bright. I am a Republican; I have voted the ticket since 1858. Mr. McKinley's record is all right. He voted twice when in congress for free silver.

"But is that possible, or even probable?" "I feel sure it is. When the Brussels conference met it could have been accomplished. But England stood in the way-four out of five delegates-Bertram, Curry, Rivers, Wilson, Alfred de Rothschild and Freemantle declared England would not agree to restore silver as standard money.

"When was that?" "One in December, 1894, and the other the 17th of last month. The resolutions passed unanimously. But, in his speech, said: 'We will do for as much as any nation to restore silver as standard money.'

"Why has it been there is an impression that the Republicans declared for a gold standard at St. Louis?" "Two reasons. One is that people have not carefully read the money plank. The other is the delegates from Oregon and Washington came back and generally proclaimed that it stood for gold.

The farmers in the Palouse and the Big Bend, and the laborers of Seattle and Tacoma and Spokane are earnest for bimetalism. They don't want any talk of 'honest dollars'—the gold dollars that now buy twice as much wheat as they did prior to 1873.

Just as he was stepping on the cars the reporter asked, "What do you think of Tom Reed's speech at Portland, Me., delivered on Thursday night?" "If the telegraphic report of Mr. Reed's speech is accurate, he has relapsed into a gold monometallist. He is a goldite, and no mistake.

Because, if prices have not fallen in consequence of scarcity of money, then there is no need of the principal commercial nations joining together to restore the white metal to its old position, a position it held for thousands of years prior to 1873.

Faithful a New Yorker. NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Charles Ring Fairchild, reported as having been probably murdered, in a dispatch from Butte, Mont., is a son of Leroy W. Fairchild, the gold pen manufacturer, of this city, but at present out of the city.

Heavy Storm in New England. BOSTON, Sept. 10.—The northeast storm which swept the New England coast last night, has not entirely passed, although the force has somewhat diminished.

Bank Suspended. NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 10.—The Mutual National bank has suspended.

Torpedo-Boat Launched. BIRMINGHAM, R. I., Sept. 10.—The torpedo boat, No. 8, was launched today. The work of putting in her machinery will be accomplished as soon as possible.

Will Go to Buffalo. ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 10.—The Democratic primary in the third assembly district selected Senator Hill as one of the delegates to the state convention.

A Determined Suicide. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.—Hamona Wells, a young woman, aged about 25, died at the receiving hospital. She jumped into the bay from Powell street wharf this morning, and when rescued and taken to the receiving hospital she had eaten poisoned chocolates, determined to commit suicide.

Raising Bank Rate. LONDON, Sept. 10.—The Evening Standard says the unexpected raising of the bank rate from 2 to 2 1/2 per cent, change since February 22, 1896, forecasts further gold withdrawals and has created surprise on the stock exchange.

Bandit in Limbo. VISALIA, Cal., Sept. 10.—Frank Davenport was arrested at a cabin near Sequoia mills. He is now in jail here charged with being an accomplice in the attempt made by Dan McCall to rob the Southern Pacific train near Tague's on the 18th of last March.

Cyclone France. PARIS, Sept. 10.—A violent cyclone swept over portions of this city this afternoon, omnibuses, cabs and stalls in the streets overturned trees blown down, store windows broken, carriages sunk in the river Seine and the firemen had to be called. Many persons were injured.

COLORADO POLITICS.

Silver Forces Will Present a United Front. DENVER, Sept. 10.—The Democratic electoral ticket has been endorsed by the Republican, Populist and silver conventions, insuring a solid front for Bryan and Sewall.

HILL, THE CRAFTY. Don't Want to Be Restricted in His Actions. ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 10.—Senator Hill telegraphed as follows today to Norton Chase, chairman Albany county Democratic convention:

"I observe in the morning papers that I have been elected a delegate from the Third Albany district to the state convention, under instructions to vote for the endorsement of the Chicago platform and candidates. This action is taken in opposition to my wishes and judgment, as expressed to you yesterday and I decline to accept the election upon the conditions imposed or upon any conditions which would restrict my freedom at Buffalo to act in such a manner as I consider best for the interest of my party."

Bryans Coming Trip. LINCOLN, Sept. 10.—The following is the itinerary of the Southern and Eastern trip of W. J. Bryan, as given by him:

He will leave Lincoln Friday, September 11 at 9:15 p. m., arriving in Kansas City at 6:10 the morning of the 12th. He will not speak at this place, but will take a train for St. Louis, passing through Mexico and Moberly, Mo., at which places he will make short speeches, and will get into St. Louis at 6 o'clock. That evening, he will address audiences at the Auditorium, Music hall and Chubb's cave.

He will go to Mayaville and that night return to Lexington, where he will start for Asheville, N. C., passing through Harrison, and Knoxville, Tenn., being in the latter city the next morning, and arrive at Asheville in the afternoon. After speaking there, Bryan will spend two days campaigning in North Carolina, but the places where he will speak, he could not tell.

The Unholy Fusion. FORT WORTH, Texas, Sept. 10.—The Republican state convention reconvened this morning, with a full representation. The credentials committee reported forty contests, all of which were adjusted amicably. The committee on resolutions recommended the appointment of a committee of three, with pentary power to confer with a similar committee of gold standard Democrats and Populists looking to the amicable division of congressmen. The Populists are enthusiastic over the matter. Coalition is already practically arranged. Indications are that E. H. B. Green will be chosen unanimously for governor.

Earthquake Shock. ST. LOUIS, Sept. 10.—Special to the Post Dispatch from Grand Tower, Ill., says: At 8:25 this morning an earthquake shock of about thirty seconds duration was felt. It came from a northwesterly direction.

Pennsylvania Fusion. HARRISBURG, Sept. 10.—Silver men were in full control of the Democratic state convention which convened today. A plan to fuse with the Populists, giving them four out of thirty electors agreed upon.
