TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Telegraphers of Canada Have Walked Out.

LEADVILLE STRIKE STILL ON.

Other Important News of National Interest.

Strike of Telegraph Operators.

MONTREAL, Oct. 1.—No trains are moving regularly on the Canadian Pacific today, except between Toronto and this city. There is talk of a compromise being effected between the strikers and the railroad. Rumors of sympathetic strikers and other branches of trainmen's organizations are rife. The road is using every inducement to hire operators in place of the strikers, but experiences great difficulty in getting competent men.

Leadville Strike Still On. LEADVILLE, Col., Oct. 1.—Every possibility of ending the strike by arbitration or other amicable means has disappeared for the time being at least.

The Powers Reply.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 1.—The text of the reply of representatives of the powers on September 15, to the denial of the Turkish government reiterates the charge of complicity of Turkish officials in the massacres, says the irritation caused by Armenian provocation has less influence in guiding the mob than the latter's knowledge of immunity enjoyed by the authors of the massacres at Anatolia, and adds that the facility with which the massacres were stopped shows the power at the disposal of the authorities, and the bad use made of it for two days.

Muslimans and Armenians Sentenced.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 1.—(Delayed in transmission.)—The extraordinary tribunal today convicted the first Mussulmans for the murder of Armenians and sentenced them to 15 years' imprisonment. At the same time, however, a long list of Armenians suspected of being implicated in the outbreak were condemned to death. The mission of Artin Pasha to reconcile the Armenians is not making any progress.

Fire in Milwaukee.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 1.—A stubborn fire, which started in the World clothing house on Chestnut street, kept the firemen fighting fire three hours today. Three stories were burned out, two being occupied by clothing companies the other by William Paschens crockery house. The loss will probably exceed \$100,000. Four members of engine company No. 2 were rendered insensible by smoke.

Killed the Wrong Person.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 1.—Jennie Love was shot in the head and instantly killed by William Swanson last night. The testimony of several witnesses goes to show that the bullet which ended the woman's life was intended for Wm. Lee, a negro with whom Swanson had been quarreling. Jealousy about the woman is the cause alleged.

Sugar Refinery Shut Down.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 1.—The Spreckles Sugar Refinery, operated by the sugar trust, has shut down for an indefinite period, owing to the dull period. About 800 men are thrown out of employment.

Indicted for Forgery.

PORTLAND, Oct. 1.—George F. McConnell, ex-grand keeper of the records and seals of the Knights of Pythias, was today indicted for forgery on three accounts.

WHEAT GOING WILD.

The Indian Wheat Crop Is Probably a Failure.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—The wheat pit was again today the scene of wild excitement, marked by the advance in December, to a point 2½ cents above final figures yesterday. The aggregate days business was enormous. The reason for the bulge can be told in two words, foreign news. Reports, wheat engagements for shipment to India from Liverpool, the hitherto unheard of transaction, was the principal cause of the advance. Reports similar engagements from San Francisco lent force to the statement that the Indian crop was a failure.

Iowa's Semi Centennial.

BURLINGTON, Ia., Oct. 1.—Fifty years ago Iowa became a state. In honor of the semi-centennial anniversary 20,000 people gathered in this city today to inaugurate an eight days celebration. This is Governors day and is honored by the presence of Governor Drake and staff, several ex-governors, Vice-President Stevenson and many prominent citizens of state and nation. During the parade at noon, the reviewing stand, containing Vice-President Stevenson, Governor Drake, of Iowa, and staff and many other prominent people collapsed, throwing all to ground and injuring thirty people. Vice-President Stevenson and Governor Drake escaped with slight bruises.

Sluggers Interfered With.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 1.—"Doc" Payne and Lon Beckwith, middle-weights, met last night for a finish fight for \$250 a side and the gate receipts in Lavac's gymnasium. Payne was a favorite in the betting. Beckwith was a surprise, however, and went at Payne like a hurricane. In the seventh round, when Payne was all but knocked out, the police burst in the doors and stopped the fight.

A Collision.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 1.—Two freight trains collided last night at Phillips, on the Baltimore & Ohio Railway, 124 miles east of Pittsburgh, making one of the worst wrecks in the history of the road; one man is dead, six tramps were killed, and six others injured.

Badly Cut Up.

ROSEBURG, Or., Oct. 1.—A quarrel in a saloon between L. R. Minard and William Callahan resulted in the former receiving several severe cuts with a clasp-knife. A long gash was inflicted on the left side diagonally across the ribs, and a six inch cut on the fleshy part of the leg, between the knee and hip, and another under the left knee, severing the large cords.

Ticket Agent Robbed.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—Mrs. Addie Way, a ticket agent of the Illinois Central railway at Midway Plaisance, the old world's fair station, was robbed and beaten by a negro, after opening her office, today, her injuries being so severe that she will probably die. G. W. Eilenberger, who came into the station just as the man was about to strike the unconscious woman again, grappled with the negro, but after a struggle was rendered unconscious by a blow from a piece of gas pipe.

Murdered.

VIENNA, Oct. 1.—Advices from Belgrade says the brother of the Austrian consul has been murdered.

BRYAN IN VIRGINIA.

Will Be at St. Louis Next Saturday.

THREE SPEECHES IN ONE DAY.

Other Important Political Points of the Day.

CLARKSBURG, W. Va., Oct. 1.—The Bryan party left Grafton at 8:50 this morning and arriving here one hour later. At Grafton, the newspaper correspondents caused the arrests of two alleged pick-pockets who had been following the train for some weeks.

The prisoners asked that a subpoena be issued for Bryan, claiming he was an important witness for the defense. The magistrate refused to issue the subpoena. Consequently Bryan was not detained. Bryan spoke here at 10 o'clock to a few hundred people from the balcony of the traders hotel. A large crowd listened to him latter at the fair grounds and cheering enthusiastically. He left for Bakersburg at 11:30.

Democratic Club Convention.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 1.—Arrangements have been completed for the confederation of the national association of the Democratic clubs in the auditorium, Saturday. There will be three sessions of the convention, in morning, afternoon and evening, and big crowds are expected at each session. Bryan, it is expected will make three speeches, one at the convention, one at East St. Louis, and one to the workmen's meeting at the south side of driving park.

Nominations for Massachusetts.

BOSTON, Oct. 1.—The Republican state convention today nominated Roger Wolcott for governor; lieutenant governor, W. Murray Crane; secretary of state, William M. Olin; treasurer and receiver, General E. P. Shaw; auditor, John W. Kimball; Attorney General, Hosea M. Knowlton.

A Mysterious Affair.

SAN JOSE, Oct. 1.—Officers are busily engaged in attempting to get the facts of the murder of the Chinese woman in Chinatown. A man who claims to be the woman's husband went to Marysville a few days ago to collect \$500 alleged to be due him by a woman there. Some of the officers think the man is proprietor of a house of ill-fame and that the woman was not his wife but an inmate of the brothel. There were three men in the place when the woman was shot from the door by an alleged stranger.

Grain Riots in India.

SINLA, Oct. 1.—Serious rioting has occurred at Delhi, in connection with the rise of grain, and the military authorities have been warned by the newspapers to urge prompt government assistance for the poor class.

BRYAN WILL WIN.

The People Aroused as Never Before.

UNDO THE WRONG OF 1873.

McKinley With Every Eastern State Has Only Six to Spare.

So says Alfred Henry Lewis, the Washington correspondent to the New York Journal, and he figures it out this way:

Coming events, especially if they be of politics, cast their decided shadows before in the capital departments. There folk are the tree toads of politics. They change their color with the varying hues of changing administrations. Also, do they chirrup mightily before a storm. Just now the political tree toads here are singing lustily of Democratic victory in November, and their golden green is giving way to the ashen white of silver. By these signs one may know of McKinley's defeat, and that a teeth-gnashing day is to dawn for Hanna and his syndicate.

If this prophecy be not true, then let some earnest one take the unpaid point out the details of Republican success. Go west of the Missouri.

Can McKinley carry California—a state, by the way, which produces more gold than silver? There exists no chance of it. For years the Republicans of California have declared for free coinage at 16 to 1 as their only hope to win the state.

NO HOPE BEYOND THE MISSOURI.

Is there a McKinley hope in Oregon? Look at the last election. Does Hanna build on Washington or Idaho? If he does it's but a dream with Dubois leading the silver bolt and Squire just turning his coat.

The Dakotas are no better. Pettigrew, a senator as keenly sensitive to a public breeze as any, so finely strung as to be a very acolian harp of politics, to sing consistent with every breath of general opinion, went to the silver side of St. Louis and bolted with Dubois. Go where you will in the region west of the Missouri, there's not one green and growing blade of McKinley hope. The Dakotas, Nebraska, Kansas, all gone. Every state west of them gone. Democracy, free silver and Bryan everywhere between the Rio Grande and the Canadian line, when once you are ferried over the Missouri.

How is it south of the Mason and Dixon line? Not a McKinley state. If there is put your hand on it. Every whisper from Kentucky shows a free silver feeling flowing knee deep.

GORMAN VOUCHERS FOR MARYLAND.

Is it Maryland? The channels of the old Democracy are dank full and still rising with the flood of silver sentiment that is rushing in. The state will be swept off its feet by the tides of a rising November Democracy. The other day Gorman, whose business it is to know, said privately that Maryland would give Bryan 20,000 majority. You can take Gorman's word for Maryland. He has been over that trail too often not to know the whereabouts of all the wood and water. The man who says Gorman does not know Maryland simply publishes the fact that his intelligence has been misled. Maryland is for Bryan, and will be for Bryan on the November clean up.
