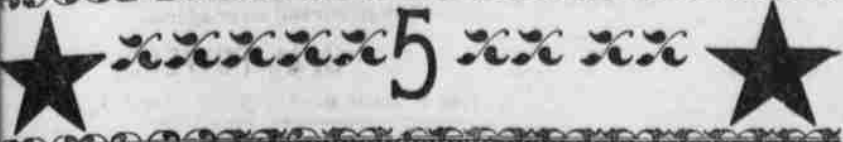

McKinley Claims the Whole Thing.

RETURNS FROM THE STATES.

Chairman Jones Believes Bryan is Elected.

COLORADO. Denver, 8 p. m.—The polls in Colorado closed at 7 o'clock and no returns are in as yet. This vote is reported to be about the same as two years ago—180,000. There is no question of the election of the Bryan election by over 100,000.

CONNECTICUT. New Haven.—With one town missing McKinley has 107,536; Bryan 64,498.

CALIFORNIA. San Francisco.—The polls closed at 5 o'clock with more money in the boxes than ever before in the history of the state. At 3 o'clock Chairman Alford, of the Democratic state committee, said the Democrats would carry California by 25,000.

Chairman McLaughlin of Republican committee would make no prediction but expressed an opinion that the Republicans had a good show to win. Sacramento.—Grove Johnson (Republican) has defeated for congress.

KENTUCKY. New York.—The Herald says McKinley will carry Kentucky by 15,000 with a Republican majority in the house and that Breckenridge is elected. Indications are that Breckenridge is defeated for congress by 1,000.

LOUISIANA. New Orleans.—Election returns are coming in slowly but indications are that the Democrats have made a clean sweep electing the congressional delegation and that Bryan has carried the state by not less than 30,000 majority.

MAINE. The Tribune says McKinley has carried Maine by 50,000.

PENNSYLVANIA. In Pennsylvania McKinley, according to latest estimates, will have 300,000 plurality.

NEW YORK.—The Herald says Pennsylvania will give McKinley 250,000 plurality.

SOUTH DAKOTA. Sioux Falls by 80 majority. The total vote is about 2,100. This indicates the county of Minnehaha has gone for Bryan by a small majority. McKinley had a majority in Pettigrew's ward.

TENNESSEE. New York.—The Journal (Bryan) concedes Tennessee to McKinley by 20,000.

Nashville.—The Republican committee admits that Bryan has carried the state.

TEXAS. Galveston concedes the election of Bryan and Sewall, electors and the election of Culbertson, silver Democrat for governor.

UTAH. Salt Lake.—The polls closed at 7 p. m. A very heavy vote was cast, twice as large as any ever polled in the state on account of the woman's vote. It will be late in the morning, if not the afternoon, before the count can be completed. Indications are that Bryan has carried the state by at least 10,000 majority. The legislature, which will elect a United States senator is still claimed by both parties.

VERMONT. The Herald says Vermont gives McKinley 38,000 plurality.

BRYAN'S LAST WORDS. Lincoln.—Bryan was met at the railroad station Tuesday on his arrival from Omaha by the Bryan Home Guards, consisting largely of farmers, who received him with a shout of "Sweet Home," the band playing "Home, Sweet Home." The guard and a miscellaneous concourse followed the carriages. The sidewalks were lined with people and there were many shouts along the way for the Democratic standard-bearer, interrupted frequently with cheers for his opponent. When Bryan reached his residence after voting, a large number of neighbors and friends were assembled in front of the house. The Bryan Home Guards formed a line reaching from the street to his house. The band started the air, "Home, Sweet Home" and when at last he reached his house, a mighty shout went up from over a thousand throats. They asked for a speech, and turning to them with a voice shaking with emotion, he said a few words. They cheered him repeatedly. He said: "Ladies and gentlemen: I have now done all I can to secure the success of this campaign, and for me there is nothing left but to await the returns. I want to thank my good friends who have been so kind and courteous in my leaving and my returning, and whatever may be the result of this campaign, I shall always be able to say that my fellow-citizens agreed with me in politics and did everything in their power to secure my success in this campaign."

CASTORIA. The Herald says McKinley carries the state by 1,500 to 1,800 majority. E. W. Tunnel, Democrat, for governor, is elected by fully 6,000.

SEATTLE, Nov. 4.—Secretary Maloney, of state fusion committee, said at noon: "Bryan will carry the state by 11,000 to 13,000. Rogers for governor will fall not 500 behind."

"I ask you now to manifest your further interest by giving so much of the remaining days you can to getting the vote out and to see to it that everyone understands the form of ballot so that no mistakes will be made. You understand that in this state you have the names of the bolting Democrats first on the tickets, and they did in order to perpetuate a fraud upon the voters of this state, and it is the duty of all our people to defeat the fraud if they can, by having the people understand just how the ballot reads, so each person can vote intelligently. All we have asked in this campaign is that each citizen might be allowed to vote as he pleases, and when that is done, we shall all abide by the result, whatever it may be."

AT BRYAN HEADQUARTERS. Following was summary at Chicago headquarters Tuesday night: Chairman Jones and other members of the Democratic executive committee, including Committeemen Johnson, of Kansas, and Campaign Manager, received returns in Chairman Jones' office, Chairman Washburne, of the Populist committee, was also present as were also Senators Teller, of Colorado, and Tillman, of South Carolina.

The first returns were from Rutland, Kansas, and gave 211 for Bryan and 71 for McKinley.

The early returns from Eastern states showed Republican gains in every instance. But little interest, however, was manifested in the returns admittedly Republican. The first surprise came from Baltimore which showed a big majority for McKinley indicating that the state of Maryland has gone Republican. Every report from the middle and western states was eagerly watched and much gratification was expressed at the first report from Michigan. This was Gratiot county, giving Bryan 800 plurality. This county gave Harrison a plurality of 1,376 in 1892.

"We have no reason to lose heart," said Chairman Jones after reading returns from New York and other eastern states, "all this early stuff is what we have expected."

The first really bad news began about 7:30 p. m. in the returns from states south of the "line." Early returns from both Tennessee and Kentucky showed large Republican gains as did the first returns from Illinois outside of Cook county. Two precincts in Bloomington, the home of Vice-President Stevenson, gave McKinley 200 plurality. The returns from Michigan are more encouraging. At 8:30 p. m. Chairman Campaign claimed that state by 25,000.

WASHINGTON'S BULLETINS. ASHLAND, Nov. 4.—4 precincts in Klamath county, including Klamath Falls, gives McKinley 244; Bryan 243. County probably give Bryan one hundred majority.

CHICAGO.—At 11 a. m. associated press sent out the following: It is reasonably certain McKinley & Hobart are elected, but indications today are that margin more narrow than expected. Returns from the Dakotas, Kentucky, Oregon and Calif., still meager.

COAST BULLETINS: California.—Latest returns from 813 precincts out of 2,377 in the state give McKinley 58,045; Bryan 56,267. California is claimed by both parties but indications are that it has gone for McKinley.

Probable congressional results: First district for Barham, Republican.

Latest from senatorial and assembly districts indicate probability that Republicans will have a majority in the legislature on joint ballot. This is conceded by the San Francisco Examiner.

CHICAGO.—At 11:45 a. m. the Associated Press says the situation may be reduced to this: Certain for McKinley, 226; almost certain for McKinley, 13; indications for McKinley, 29; probable for Bryan, 23; doubtful, 29; total, 447.

Portland.—229 precincts out of 1,190 in the state of Washington, give McKinley 10,624; Bryan, 13,429.

Sterling precinct, Jackson county; Or., gives McKinley, 21; Bryan, 9, Palmer; 2; Uniontown precinct, Bryan, 77; McKinley, 38.

HYONCALLA, McKinley, 103. Bryan, 7. Douglas county, Or. 11 California.—5 complete returns from 30 out of 2064 precincts outside of San Francisco give McKinley 74085; Bryan 69978. Same in '92 gave Harrison 60361; Cleveland 58711.

CALIFORNIA FOR MCKINLEY. San Francisco.—California has joined the east in the McKinley landslide and a bearer will reach 5000 at least. Great interest is centered on the congressional ticket. Outside of this city only one Democratic representative seems to have been chosen. The legislature is safely Republican.

ARKANSAS. Little Rock.—The fusion ticket in Arkansas was elected yesterday, by a majority of 25,000 to 30,000. Democrats for congress were all elected by good majorities.

MICHIGAN. Detroit.—The returns are incomplete from 83 counties and indicate that McKinley's plurality is 40,000 the same returns give Pingree for governor an estimated plurality of 58,000.

WYOMING. Cheyenne.—Thirty-nine Wyoming precincts give McKinley 1400, Bryan 1402. Democratic gain of 284. At this ratio the entire state will give Bryan 1300 plurality. Congressional and state tickets ran pretty nearly the same as the electoral ticket.

DELAWARE DOUBTFUL. Wilmington.—Returns in Delaware are still incomplete in detail, but it is known McKinley carries the state by 1,500 to 1,800 majority. E. W. Tunnel, Democrat, for governor, is elected by fully 6,000.

TODAY'S BULLETINS,

Line Up Very Favorable to Bryan.

MR. MCKINLEY MAY GO IN

But It Will Be On a Very Narrow Margin.

LATER BULLETINS. Yankton, S. D.—In 239 out of 1037 precincts South Dakota gives McKinley 1,900 plurality. Latest returns show gradual Republican gain in Populist strongholds. Indications now are that the legislature will be Republican and the state will go to McKinley by 3,000.

Chicago, 11 p. m.—United Press says that Wyoming and Washington are no longer doubtful but absolutely certain for Bryan.

Portland.—333 precincts out of 1100 in state of Washington give McKinley 15,930; Bryan 20,848. Governor Sullivan (Republican) 16,670; Rogers (Fusion) 19,588.

Congressman Doolittle (Rep.) 15,070; Hite (Rep.) 5,198, Lewis (Fusion) 20,301. Jones (Fusion) 18,570.

UNITED PRESS REPORT. New York.—The United Press report gives electoral vote, corrected to 1 p. m. as follows: McKinley, 298; Bryan, 163; doubtful, 28.

California.—Returns from two-thirds of the precincts in this state, give McKinley a plurality of over 3,000.

Latest returns from Kentucky increase the Bryan vote in that state, but McKinley will probably carry it by a small majority. Republicans have handsome majority in the next congress. Latest returns from California favor McKinley.

Dallas, Texas.—Bryan will carry the state by nearly 50,000 with the Democratic state ticket somewhat behind.

Washington, D. C.—There was an air of unconcealed satisfaction in administration circles this morning over the result of the election. Members of the president's official family preserved dignified silence in hope of thus making easy the task of healing all breaches in party.

Nashville, Tenn.—There is a small Democratic plurality in this state all though the Republicans claim the state by a small plurality.

LATEST ASSOCIATED PRESS. Portland.—229 precincts out of 1100 in state of Washington give McKinley 10,694; Bryan 13,429.

Des Moines, Iowa.—All Republican congressmen Iowa are elected beyond a doubt. McKinley's plurality is estimated 89,000 to 90,000.

Topeka, Kans.—Chairman Breidenbach of Populist committee claims Bryan and Leedy carried the state by about 18,000. He says fusion elected six of eight congressmen.

St. Louis.—Democrats claim 60,000 plurality for Bryan. R. P. Bland is elected congressman in eight district.

Columbus.—More complete returns from outside precincts reduce McKinley's plurality to 50,000 in this state. Four years ago this city gave Cleveland 6,800 plurality. Return from San Francisco make California sure for McKinley. Chairman McLaughlin, of the Republican state committee, claims 8,000 majority. Chairman Alford, of the Democratic committee, does not yet concede the state.

CLAIMS DELAWARE. Canton.—A private dispatch from trusted sources at Wilmington, Del., says the state chairman conceded the state to McKinley. This raises the certain column to 224.

INDIANA. Indianapolis.—While not a fourth of the state has been heard from, returns are sufficiently scattered to indicate a pretty heavy McKinley plurality.

SOUTH DAKOTA GETS THERE. Yankton, S. D.—The gain in the Bryan vote over the estimate is 20 per cent thus far, while McKinley's gain is only 3 per cent. If this continues Bryan will have majority.

The fight has not been given up by Democrats. As late as 12 o'clock today Senator Jones said: "Indications are that we have carried Indiana. If we have, Bryan is elected. We have carried Tennessee and Kentucky, and my best advices from Minnesota is that Towne is elected. I have just received a telegram from Bryan, in which he says he will carry his state by 10,000."

REPUBLICAN CLAIMS. Payne, at Republican headquarters, is not disturbed by the Jones prediction. "The result was known last night," he said, "and as then announced is substantially correct. Indiana, Minnesota and California are safely in the Republican column. Mr. Hirsch, chairman of the state committee, advises me from Port and that McKinley carries Oregon by 3,500."

CLAIMS OF REPUBLICAN. Chicago, Nov. 4.—Returns from state indicate Republicans will have large majority in both houses of legislature which will elect a U. S. senator to succeed Palmer. Entire Republican state ticket is elected by majorities ranging from 100,000 to 125,000. John R. Tanner, for governor, will get about 25,000 votes less than McKinley.

Portland.—Returns from Oregon so far give McKinley, 33,000; Bryan, 28,532; McKinley's majority, 4,528.

Six counties in the state have no telegraph offices. Will be several days before returns are received. It is estimated McKinley's majority will be cut down to 3,000.

Yankton, S. D.—Latest returns show gradual Republican gain in Populist strongholds. Indications now are legislature will be Republican and state go to McKinley by 3,000.

Topeka, Kans.—At 2 o'clock best information indicates Bryan and Leedy, fusion, carried Kansas by at least 7,000. Fusionists seem to have five congressmen. Republicans, one, Broderick. Legislature on joint ballot appears to be two-thirds fusion.

Frankfort, Ky.—Chairman Roberts telegraphs, estimating Kentucky for McKinley, by 6,000 to 8,000. Legislature Republican, assuring the election of a Republican to succeed Blackburn.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 4.—There is every indication that the state gives 3000 to 6000 Republican majority. Whole Republican state ticket elected.

Cincinnati.—Special to Time-Star from Wheeling, W. Va., says: Republicans carry by 10,000 for national and state ticket. Republicans also have all four congressmen and legislature.

San Francisco.—Returns from two-thirds of the precincts in California, including San Francisco, give McKinley a plurality of over 3,000.

Louisville, Nov. 4.—Later returns from missing counties indicate McKinley has at least 5,000 majority in Kentucky.

INDIANAPOLIS.—Late returns show big Democratic gains in southern Republican strongholds of state but while McKinley's majority is reduced he will still carry the state.

Lincoln, Neb.—Bryan does not admit defeat but does not claim his election, saying he is waiting for complete returns. Later telegrams gave him more encouragement than earlier bulletins.

Only meager and scattering returns have been received from California, 9; and Kansas 10, so that neither party can yet claim these states. Situation therefore may be reduced to this: Certain for McKinley, 220; indication for McKinley, 25. Certain for Bryan, 165. Probably for Bryan, 27. Doubtful, 28. Total, 447.

LATEST FROM OREGON. Portland.—But few returns have been received from Oregon today. Those received from Oregon today, change the estimates already made. Bryan shows some gain in the interior but not sufficient to overcome the large McKinley majority in Multnomah county. Republicans now claim the state by at least 3,000. Democrats do not yet concede the state.

THE JOURNAL does not concede Bryan's defeat, but as we go to press condition is strongly in his favor.

WASHINGTON FOR SQUARE. The Silver Republican Senator Carried it for Bryan.

SEATTLE, Nov. 4.—King county will give 500 majority for the fusion ticket. Returns coming in slowly show Rogers for governor running with Lewis for congress, ahead of his ticket. Republicans concede the state to Bryan. Squire will probably be re-elected senator.

Electoral Votes by States Are Close.

THE DISPATCHES ARE COLORED

To Make An Apparent Case for McKinley.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—It is a reasonable certainty that McKinley and Hobart are elected, but the majority is likely to be, from indications at 4 o'clock, much narrower than was looked for as a result of the earliest dispatches. Following electoral votes are conceded to McKinley:

Table of electoral votes conceded to McKinley by state: Connecticut 6, Illinois 24, Iowa 13, Maine 6, Maryland 10, Massachusetts 15, Michigan 15, Minnesota 19, Missouri 14, New Hampshire 4, New Jersey 10, New York 36, Ohio 23, Pennsylvania 32, Rhode Island 4, Vermont 4, Wisconsin 12.

Total 220. Probabilities point to Delaware with three votes and Indiana with 15 as Republican, furnishing more than 224 requisite to constitute a majority of the electoral college. Three votes of North Dakota apparently belong McKinley, also 4 of Oregon, and 13 of Kentucky. But returns are too inadequate to justify a definite conclusion. Following votes are conceded to Bryan:

Total 165. Only meager and scattering returns have been received from California, 9; and Kansas 10, so that neither party can yet claim these states. The situation therefore may be reduced to this: Certain for McKinley 220. Indications for McKinley 25. Certain for Bryan 135. Probably for Bryan 7. Doubtful 26. Total 447.

ILLINOIS. Chicago.—The noon edition of the Chicago Dispatch, the only silver organ in Chicago, concedes the election of McKinley, and calls on all citizens to declare their loyalty to the will of the people.

The noon editions of the Journal and News, however, former predictions, assuring the election of McKinley.

NEVADA ALL RIGHT. Carson.—Returns from Nevada will not be complete for ten days. Newslands, silver, is certainly elected congressman and according to best estimate 30 out of 45 members of the legislature will be Democratic. Bryan undoubtedly carried the state.

JONES IS CONFIDENT. Chicago.—Chairman Jones today sent the following telegram to Bryan: "I have all along counted on one hundred and fifty-six Southern votes, and sixty-eight from the west of the Missouri river, which leaves seven for us to get to be successful. I counted on Indiana, Michigan and Minnesota, and we have no information except what the press dispatches sent out to the contrary. The only Southern state conceded is Maryland."

WEST VIRGINIA WITH US. Wheeling, W. Va., Nov. 4.—At 11 a. m. Returns show Republican gains over 1892, and there is strong probability the state has gone for McKinley.

NEBRASKA ALL RIGHT. Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 4.—Chairman Post, of Republican state committee, at 10 o'clock conceded the state to the Fusion ticket on presidential electors and governor. It appears quite certain the Populist will get four of six congressmen and may have five.
