DAKLANE, Cal., Nov. 25.—The report that Mrs. Anna Murdoch, of San Francisco, had been arrested in New York on Thursday last and arraigned in the Brooklyn police court, together with the information telegraphed from there that Robert E. Woodward, of the United States army, and once an officer of the Salvation Army, was discovered with a young Oakland woman in operation. Robert E. Woodward is reported to have married her in a very few days, after an engagement of more than two years, but now the truth is revealed to her, she says, and the thought can never be.

Unfortunate Natives Are Under Control of England and France.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Nov. 25 Reports have been received from New Hebrides islands, lying west of Fiji that the natives are being sold like sheep for from £6 to £10 per head, and that many are subjected to great cruelties. The New Hebrides are under joint Anglo-French control. The New Hebrides Company, which has large interests in the island, last year sent a deputation of Sir T. McIlwraith, the colonial treasurer of Queensland, complaining of this joint control, and suggesting that Sir W. McGregor, administrator of British New Guinea, have jurisdiction over the New Hebrides. Sir T. McIlwraith said in reply that the only solution lay in the annexation of the island by Great Britain or the establishment of protectorate over them.

VOTERS COMING TO POLL.

Lists to be Made up for Each Ward in the City.

THE JOURNAL proposes to devote some space to securing a complete list of the legal voters of Salem.

WHO IS A LEGAL VOTER.

The city charter provides that a person offering to vote at the city election must be a qualified elector under the constitution of the state, and a resident of the city for a period of thirty days, next preceding the election, and shall have resided thirty days next preceding the election in the ward in which he offers to vote, and is not disqualified by a failure to pay city taxes or fines.

THE JOURNAL has started a movement to compile a list of the legal voters of each ward, and presents below a first attempt to secure names with residence in the first ward. The addresses of the voters are as found in the latest city directory. The voters are persons who cast their ballot in that ward in the June election, when the constitution requires that a citizen shall vote for county officers in the precinct where he resides.

CITY ELECTION AND CITY HALL.

Routine Work by the City Council in Special Session.

Salem's city council met Tuesday evening in adjourned session, when city election and city hall matters were considered. The following judges were appointed to act at the city election, December 7:

First ward—Polling place, No. 3 fire engine house. Judges of election: W. D. Jeffries, C. M. Parmenter and Henry Eppley.

Second ward—Polling place, Basey's livery stable. Judges of election: Gec. P. Litchfield, J. I. Thompson and J. A. Van Eaton.

Third ward—Polling place, the armory. Judges of election: William Manning, G. G. Van Wagner and R. W. Carey.

Fourth ward—Polling place, Westcott's livery stable. Judges of election: G. A. Rockwell, O. H. Fay and G. G. Gans, Jr.

The ordinance committee reported favorably upon the "curfew" ordinance, recommending, however, that some bell other than the "fire bell" be designated for this purpose.

The ordinance to keep minors out of houses of evil resort was also recommended, and both will probably be passed at the next regular session.

The following report was brought in by the city hall committee:

"We, your committee on city hall, beg to report that we met today with the architect of the city hall, W. D. Pugh, and took under consideration the matter of the construction of the area-way walls for the city hall. The architect explained the plans and specifications to the committee and informed us that there were never any plans for the area-way wall drawn and that the same were not included nor figured upon by the contractors at the time the proposals were received for the construction of the building. We, therefore, recommend that the interpretation of this matter by the architect, W. D. Pugh, be accepted by the council as final. (Signed) Thomas Holman, W. T. Rigdon, Squire Farrar, Hiram Smith, Committee."

This report was adopted, when the ordinance contracting for the work at issue was read first and second times.

CHESHAM, Wash., Nov. 25.—News of a horrible tragedy, which occurred last Friday in the eastern portion of the county was received here by the coroner last evening. Mrs. A. R. Sweeney, the wife of a farmer living near Ashford postoffice, out the throats of her three children, aged five and three years and nine months, and then cut her own throat with a razor. Her husband arrived shortly after and found his entire family weltering in a pool of blood. The three year old girl is dead and the eldest is expected to die, but the baby will live. The mother did not succeed in killing herself, but her condition is precarious. It is supposed the woman is insane. The coroner and sheriff have left for the scene, which is fifty miles from the railroad.

The Oregon.

SANTA CRUZ, Cal., Nov. 25.—The battleship Oregon was sighted off Lighthouse point yesterday. For a half hour she remained there and practiced with her big guns. Several shots were fired toward Monterey, and then she turned around and sent shots in a northerly direction. The battleship moved rapidly under steam while the firing continued in different directions. After an hour's firing she came to anchor a mile from the wharf. She behaved admirably under the rapid fire of her guns.

MOCKERY

Was the Trial in Ft. Cobanas

American Prisoners Allowed Neither Counsel nor Interpreter.

HAVANA, Nov. 25.—The Competitor prisoners have been tried by court-martial in the fortress of Cabanas in spite of Consul-General Lee's official protest, filed just before he left Havana. The exceptions taken by the prisoners were overruled by the naval courts. General Lee's note was pigeon-holed, and in defiance of Secretary Olney's intimation of disapproval, the Competitor's crew and Mr. Melton, the American newspaper correspondent, have again been tried by a drum-head court, sitting within the walls of a Spanish fortress, where, according to Captain-General Weyler's orders, the representative of the United States consulate may not enter.

The prisoners were allowed neither interpreter nor counsel. Those partly acquainted with Spanish were compelled to interpret for the others. So quickly was the affair conducted that Acting Consul-General Springer does not yet know, it is said, that the case was virtually closed November 14, on which day Melton, Maza, Dr. Vedia and the witness, George Ferran, were forced by Naval Judge Fernandez to sign statements admitting their complicity in the filibustering expedition which the Competitor is alleged to have brought under Menon and Labord to the Pinar del Rio coast. This written evidence is now under consideration by the court.

Judge Saul said today that a decision may be rendered at any moment. It is expected that all members of the party whose American citizenship has not been clearly shown will be shot. The bona fide Americans probably will be sentenced to from three to ten years imprisonment in some Spanish penal station off the coast of Africa.

THE PRIMARIES.—Republican primaries will be held in each ward of this city on Saturday. So far no opposition primaries have been called and none will probably be held. Tickets can be put in the field without any nominating primary, and there will probably be independent candidates.

Miss Jennie Turner, an opera singer, the woman who claims to be engaged, and she expresses a determination to institute a suit against Woodward for breach of promise, and at the same time prosecute Mrs. Murdoch for the part she played in a love affair between two young people. To the latter attributes all the misery she has made to endure, and she will seek to recover damages from Mrs. Murdoch who is reported to be wealthy.

BRYAN

Paying Respects to Denver.

ESPECIALLY WELCOMED.

Two Thousand Ladies Shake His Hand at the Hotel.

DENVER, Nov. 25.—Had William J. Bryan come to Denver as a conquering hero, whose victory presaged the restoration of silver, he would not have received any more enthusiastic greetings than those given him here. The occasion of his visit is the 20th anniversary of the admission of Colorado into the Union. Before being nominated for the presidency he agreed to speak at the exercises commemorative of this event. He arrived at 7:15 this morning and was met at the depot by a committee of prominent citizens, including T. M. Patterson, C. S. Thomas and Mayor McMurray. Even at that early hour several thousand people were assembled at the Union depot, who swung their hats and cheered lustily.

Bryan was driven to the residence of C. S. Thomas, where he breakfasted and remained until 10 a. m., when he went to the Brown Palace hotel to attend a reception given by the women of Denver. Mrs. T. M. Patterson presided, and in a few brief remarks introduced Bryan as the "first president of the 20th century."

Mrs. Mary C. C. Bradford delivered an address of welcome. Mr. Bryan spoke for half an hour, being frequently interrupted by applause from 2000 women who filled the rotunda and balconies. As a souvenir a memorandum-book of Colorado, in chased silver was presented to him, he having declined to receive a valuable silver service. After speeches the ladies filed past, shaking hands with him. On a drive about the city this afternoon he will make half a dozen outdoor speeches.

From the testimony that was introduced it seems the deceased was confined in the "epileptic" ward Tuesday of each week is known as bath day. Some of the patients require assistance of an attendant while bathing, while others are allowed to bathe themselves. The deceased, it appears, was allowed the privilege of bathing yesterday afternoon, and it is thought, while in the bath tub she was stricken with an epileptic fit, that proved fatal in its results. The absence of attendants from the bath room rendered no assistance, which, had it been available, would probably have been of no lasting benefit.

Having heard all the testimony of the six witnesses, the jury rendered the following verdict in accordance with the facts of the case: "That the deceased was Eva York, a native of Marion County Oregon, was about 30 years of age, that she came to her death on November 24, 1896, by an epileptic fit while in the act of bathing in a bath-tub in the Oregon State Insane Asylum, where she has been for five years as an inmate and the jury further finds that the superintendent and attendants of the insane asylum are responsible for the death of said deceased. Eva York. Signed I. W. Miller, foreman; J. A. Cook, L. S. Winters, C. M. Parmenter, Z. K. Ferguson, S. K. Linton."

RELATIVES OF DECEASED. Deceased has a brother residing near Hubbard. He was telegraphed last evening regarding his sister's death but has as yet not been heard from. Should no word be received from him before this evening, the remains will be interred in the asylum burying grounds.

LIBEL SUIT.

Scandalous Attempt at Jury-Bribing Comes to Light.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—When the trial of Lady Senia Scott, mother of Countess Russell; John Cockerton, engineer; Frederick Käst, groom, and William Aylett, charged by Russell with criminal libel, was resumed, Justice Hawkins announced that a scandalous attempt had been made to tamper with the jury by means of an anonymous letter to the foreman. The justice added he hoped to discover the writer, who if found would have cause to regret his actions.

Earl Russell, the first witness emphatically denied the allegations of misconduct.

Met at the Train by Hanna.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 25.—Gen. Samuel Themas, the New York railway magnate, an ex-Governor Merriam, of Minnesota, arrived and were met at the station by M. A. Hanna, and subsequently the three gentlemen held a conference. Messrs. Thomas and Merriam will go to Canton and visit the president-elect. It has been definitely decided that General Horace Porter, of New York, will act as marshal at the inauguration ceremonies.
