

ROBBED PENDLETON SALOON

Tall Blonde Man With Red Moustache Gets Busy

Handled a Gun, Stood the Boys up in Good Style and Captured 25 Dollars

The "Last Chance" saloon, on Main street is out about \$25 in silver and nickels. H. M. Kennedy, the night man, is recovering from the unexpected vision of six large 38-caliber edges looking him in the face, and an unknown robber with red hair is spending to safety with the boogie, as the result of a hold-up at the saloon shortly before 3 o'clock this morning.

The bartender at the saloon was in the room alone this morning, and just preparing to close the place, when a tall man, with a sandy moustache entered the front door, sprang the latch,

and ordered the man behind the counter to throw up his hands, at the same time showing an ugly looking revolver under the nose of the astonished saloon man. The hands went up.

The invader then ordered Mr. Kennedy to throw the sack of silver on the bar, which he did. Not satisfied with the first sack the robber asked for another one, and was handed a small one containing several dollars in nickels and dimes.

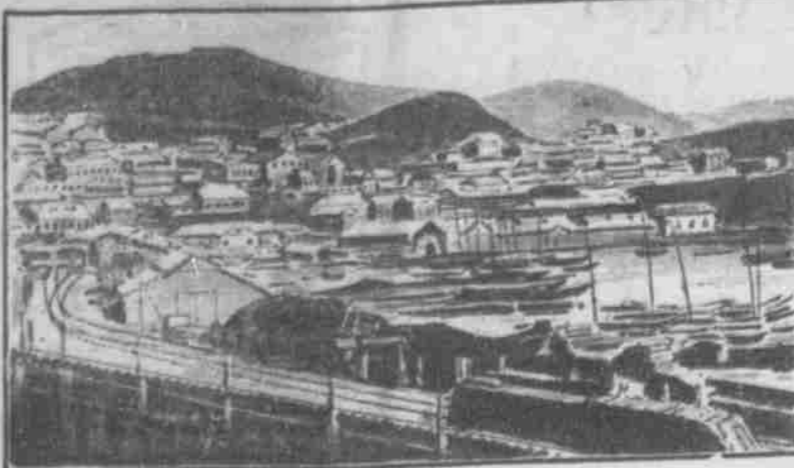
He also secured a favorable report on his bill extending to Oregon, Washington and California the law permitting the cutting of timber from the public domain for use in developing mining claims.

Russia has patiently worked and has expended millions of rubles on the defences of Vladivostok, which is the eastern terminal of the Trans-Siberian railway. This great stronghold hardly will be an early object of attack by the Japanese, for the reason that it is remote from the region in which the war must first be fought—Corea and Manchuria—and, should Vladivostok ever be under siege, it will take not only a mighty force by sea, but an immense army of investment to reduce it. Furthermore, Vladivostok is not a city which can be easily starved out. For nearly two years prior to the outbreak of the present hostilities the shipment of live domestic animals from Manchuria and Corea to Vladivostok has been extremely heavy. They are put in pasture in the vicinity and are permitted to breed against the day when the place will be besieged.

STORM SWEEPS CALIFORNIA

Sausalito Under Water--Houses Wrecked in San Francisco-- and Rivers Are Again Running Wild

San Francisco, March 10.—The worst wind and rain storm in 13 years swept over Central and Northern California and Southern Oregon last night and this morning, causing heavy property loss, and perhaps loss of life. In many places it flooded the business quarter, and Sausalito, California, is under water. No vessels arrived here this morning. It is feared there are some disasters along the coast. A number of ships in the bay were badly damaged. In the city, barns, fences, signs and roofs were wrecked. In the downtown districts the water backed

up, flooding the cellars. In the upper part of a six-story building in the course of construction, on Bush and Polk, considerable damage was done by the wind, and the whole building is in danger of falling over. The fire department is considering the advisability of tearing it down. A three-story building, in the course of construction on Lake, near Sixth avenue, was blown over and completely demolished. The schooner Ernest went ashore on Goat Island. All the crew are reported to have escaped, and it is feared the vessel cannot be saved.

Rates From Pacific Coast Points Account the Louisiana Purchase Exposition.

During the continuance of the world's fair at St. Louis this summer special excursion rates to St. Louis and Chicago will hereafter be announced on certain set dates in each month. These rates will be as follows:

- To St. Louis and return \$67.50
- To Chicago and return \$72.50
- To Chicago with return from St. Louis \$70.00
- To St. Louis with return from Chicago \$70.00

For going or return passage over the Shasta route \$12.50 will be added. Tickets sold for Chicago and return at \$72.50 will be available in one direction through St. Louis or through Kansas City and St. Louis.

The rates will be announced for days in May, June, July, August and September. The tickets will provide for a going passage within ten days, and for return limit any time within ninety days from date of sale. Stop-over privileges in each direction within these limits.

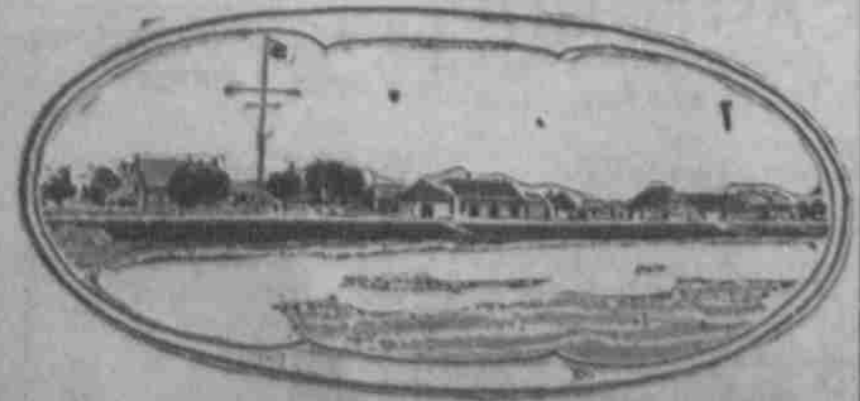

guilty of nothing that bears even the tinge of criminality.

"What was the motive of it? Wasn't it to give congress notice that the department held something over congress, and that congress had better let the department alone?" he inquired, his words being drowned by applause from both sides. "Are you going to meet it," he demanded.

Hill (Conn.) likewise mentioned in the Bristow report, denied that he had done anything improper. He had, he said, submitted certain questions to General Bristow, answers to which he had been refused. "I am going to vote for a resolution to investigate myself, and to investigate the fourth assistant postmaster-general," he said, amid a round of applause. Holding up a copy of the report, Hill vehemently declared: "That document is the production of a liar and a scoundrel."

L. and C. H. Fitzgerald and S. and N. Barnes, have also deeded a 1-11 interest in same tract to J. B. Barnes for \$125 each.

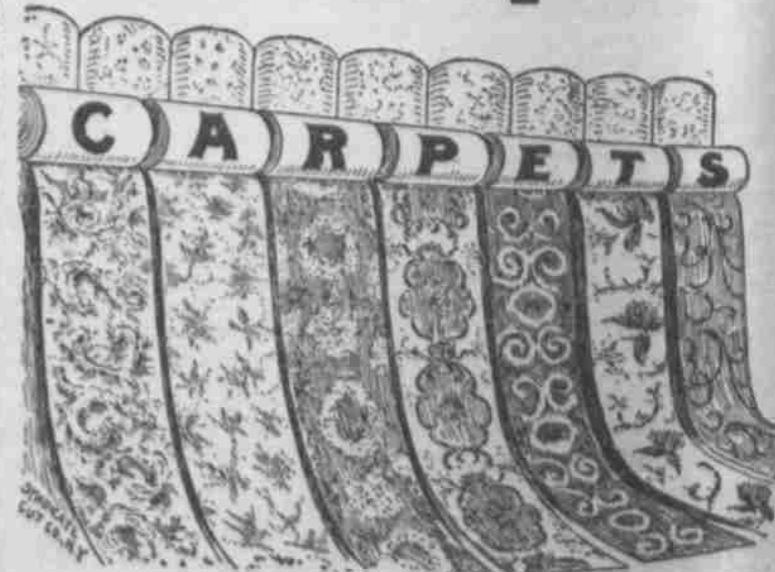
