Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the City of Salem, at the office of the undersigned, at the City Hall, in Salem, Oregon, up to 10:00 o'clock a. m., June 30, 1905, for the improvement of the following described part of Commercial street, in said city, by grading with proper crown and gutters and macadamizing in accordance with the plans and specifications now on file in the office of the City Recorder, to-wit: Commencing at a point in said street of the City of Salem, where south line of the D. L. C. of W. H. Wilson and Chloa A. Wilson, his wife, intersects said Commercial street; thence along said street to the south boundary line of said city, excepting therefrom eight feet wide along the center thereof.
