KING OF THE ROGUE

R. D. Hume Sued by a Neighbor for \$110,000 Damages

Three damage suits aggregating \$110,000 were filed in Curry county recently by Robert Burns, representative from that county, and Attorneys Venise & Freeman, of Portland, against R. D. Hume, ex-representative from Curry county, and rated one of the wealthiest men in the state. E. B. Burns appears as plaintiff in two of the actions, and his wife, Nellie F. Burns, is plaintiff in the third.

In the first complaint Burns seeks to recover \$10,000 for having been subjected to loss of time and indignities, alleged to have been brought about by the defendant, by reason of the fact that he had him arrested on a charge of anchoring a sternwheel steamer in the Rogue river. In the second complaint he sets forth that he was the owner of a parcel of land, on which he had erected a store and hotel, and there made his home, and the defendant commenced ejectment proceedings on an alleged prior right to possession of the property, and that the sheriff of the county, at the instance of Mr. Hume, did visit the place and forcibly gain entrance, removing the goods therefrom and forcibly compelling Mrs. Burns, who was in delicate health, to leave the premises, and did assault her at that time, from the effect of which she has not fully recovered. For this Mr. Burns demands \$50,000 damages.

Mrs. Burns sues on the same grounds as set forth in the second complaint of her husband, and for a like amount. Mr. Burns states that Mr. Hume at one time built a fence of barbed wire around a piece of land Burns had bought for a home, and stationed armed guards there to prevent him from taking possession. To substantiate his claim, Mr. Burns had a photograph taken of the scene. The defendant is one of the best known men in the state. He has been engaged in various enterprises on Rogue river and in Curry county, paying much attention to fishing, and it is said the trouble between the two dates from the time Burns went there, and also tried to prosper in the salmon industry.

General Hop Market.

The market has developed very little, if anything, new or interesting the past week. Brewers have shown a little interest looking for small lots to tide them over into the new crop, but we do not hear of any large business, either here or on the coast. Remaining stocks are limited and holders fairly firm in their desirable grades. Regarding the growing crop, advices from Oregon are, if anything, a trifle more favorable, some sections being comparatively free from vermin, but in other sections lice continue plenty, and growers who have not washed their yards have very poor looking vines. The growing crop in other Pacific Coast states continues in very favorable condition. From up state most reports are satisfactory, but a somewhat smaller yield is predicted in some sections, as the vines are showing that it will be a top yield. On the whole it is safe to predict a good yield, though not so large as last year. The crop on the Pacific Coast is not expected to be far from the quantity gathered last year. Foreign advices continue favorable, both in England and the Continent, and all indications point to a large and fine yield.—Waterville, N. Y., Hop Review.
