### MORE YELLOW FEVER.

Many New Cases Reported at New Orleans.

New Orleans, Sept. 11.—Twenty new cases of yellow fever were reported up to noon today, but no deaths.

### Roundup of Equitable Agents.

New York, Sept. 11.—About one thousand agents of the Equitable Life Assurance society, who last year wrote over \$150,000,000 of insurance in the South and in the region as far west as Chicago, rounded up today at the Oriental hotel at Manhattan Beach for a three days' social outing and entertainment at the expense of the company. The agents will be addressed by President Paul Morton and other officers of the society who will give them a heart-to-heart talk on ways and means for breaking down any popular distrust of the society which may exist as a result of the dissensions and differences among the heads of the society in the past.

### Fire Destroys Big Dairy Barn.

Albany, Or., Sept. 11.—A fire entailing a loss of about \$4000 visited the dairy farm of H. Bryant, just outside the city limits of Albany Sunday. The structure was a very large one, and contained 120 tons of hay, 800 bushels of oats, and a small quantity of wheat, two silos, a steam engine and farm machinery. Several calves were in the barn when the fire was discovered, and two of them were burned in the barn. The intense heat forced an end to the work of rescue. The fire is believed to be of incendiary origin. Loss, \$4000; insurance, \$1000.

### Farmers' National Congress.

Richmond, Va., Sept. 11.—The twenty-fifth annual session of the Farmers' National congress opens in Richmond tomorrow and scores of delegates and visitors are already here. Indications point to a large and representative attendance. The proceedings will open at 10 o'clock in the morning with addresses of welcome by Governor Montague, Mayor McCarthy and others. President Jarvis Jordan of Georgia will deliver his annual address in the afternoon.

## MARION CIRCUIT COURT

The adjourned session of the August term of the circuit court, which was convened this afternoon by Judge Galoway, is noted for the large number of divorce suits which are up for settlement. A number of important cases are also up for consideration. The judge will be compelled to go to Albany for Monday and Tuesday of next week, but will return the middle of the week. This is the term of court which should have been convened the first Monday in August, but which was adjourned from that date to this. For that reason the number of cases is greater than usual.

### Waterways Convention.

Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 11.—The International Waterway Commission, consisting of General O. H. Ernest, George Clinton and G. W. Wisner for the United States, and Messrs. Mabce, Coste and King for Canada, met in Buffalo today. The utilization of the water power at Sault Ste. Marie in its bearing upon the navigation levels of Lake Superior is the first subject that will be taken up by the commission. As soon as the Sault Ste. Marie problem has been passed upon, the commissioners will probably enter upon a solution of the question of regulation and control of the Niagara water supply with which is allied the American proposal to raise the level of Lake Erie. On Wednesday the commissioners will go to Niagara Falls to make a personal inspection of the power works in that city. Later in the week meetings will be held in Toronto and Hamilton, Ont.

### In Trouble Again.

Bill Anderson is in trouble again. A married woman at Los Angeles, who was raised by Uncle Bill, and whose maiden name was Susan Pettyjohn, is the cause of it all. She came up to the fair at Portland, where she persuaded a long-legged married daughter of Bill's to accompany her, and the two women came up to Salem and went to Bill's house, caught him unawares, and proceeded to punish him severely. They threw him down and paddled him with a flat board with nails in until he can hardly stand, walk or sit down. The women escaped, and Bill has been busy hunting linaments ever since.

### Madden Divorce Suit.

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 11.—The suit of Mrs. Anna Louise Madden against her husband, John E. Madden, the well known turfman, came up for hearing today before Judge Swing. The present suit is for alimony, the object of the wife being to obtain judgment against her husband in the Ohio courts before his suit against her for divorce comes up in Kentucky, it being possible under the laws of the latter state for a divorce decree to cut off the wife entirely from dower interests. Owing to the prominence of the Maddens much interest is being manifested in the case.

### Telegrams Boiled Down.

The king of Italy arrived at Monteleone today. He visited all places damaged by the earthquake, and offered all the relief possible.

It is stated at Berlin that Turkey has protested to the Russians against the massacre of the Armenians in the Caucasus. It is regarded as the bitterest taunt ever administered to Russia. An official with the jacket cables today that the Taft party will sail from Nagasaki for Kobe, thence to Yokohama, where they will attend a dinner by the tea guild and sails for San Francisco on the 27th.

### ADDITIONAL PERSONALS.

Oscar Hyster, of Dallas, is attending court in this city today.

A letter from Frank Meyers states that he will not return from Pennsylvania until the middle of October.

Miss Hattie Odekirik, bookkeeper at Boren & Hamilton's furniture store, returned this noon from an extended visit to Portland.

Mrs. A. A. Miller returned home yesterday from an extended trip through Southern Oregon and California in the interest of the Butterick Pattern Co. She also visited friends and relatives in Los Angeles and other Southern California points.

C. H. Behrens, sheriff of Shasta county, California, is in the city, awaiting the release of George Jones from the penitentiary. As soon as he is released, which will be next Wednesday, Behrens will rearrest him and return him to California. Jones is a notorious horse thief, and has a long term in the California penitentiary ahead of him.

### General Strike at Warsaw.

Warsaw, Sept. 11.—As a result of the execution Friday of Kaspschak, workers in all the factories of this city struck today. Troops patrol the streets. Many arrests have been made.
