HAWLEY VERSUS TOOZE

A Mud-Slinging Campaign That Will Re-act

Anonymous Attacks Sent Away From Home to Be-little a Faithful Man

Mr. Hawley's managers are in poor business if they cannot nominate that gentleman without engaging in a mud-slinging campaign against the man who seems to be in the lead for the nomination.

Mr. Tooze and his friends have never referred to any other Republican aspirant in a disrespectful manner, realizing that they expect to support the nominee, and leaving it to the Democratic press to bring out whatever might be said against any Republican candidate.

We repeat if the Hawley managers are responsible for what appeared in the Democratic Albany Argus and the Prohibition Newberg Graphic against Mr. Tooze they are in very small business.

If Salem managers of Mr. Hawley's campaign have to send attacks from Salem under anonymous signatures to papers in other towns to get publicity for it, the situation is a deplorable one from any standpoint.

To get up a list of Republicans any portion of whom are against Mr. Tooze they have to go back into the politics of the past twenty years, and include the socialists and Prohibitionists.

Any Republican can excuse Democratic papers for doing such things. The Democratic press have a right to attack the editor of this paper, but the same papers called him a saint when he was helping their cause.

The attempt to turn the Grand Army men of Oregon against Tooze, and in favor of Hawley will not work, as both men have a record on matters dear to the Grand Army, and Mr. Tooze has nothing to fear.

If the fight is going to be Hawley versus Tooze, let the whole history of both men come out, and for patriotic devotion to the old soldiers and the cause they fought for Mr. Tooze will stand investigation.

Remember, Mr. Tooze and his friends have not attacked Mr. Hawley, and have acted as gentlemen through this whole campaign, while the Hawley managers have gone into personalities and mud-throwing from the start.

The Newberg Graphic attacks Tooze for using a campaign card in 1904 as congressional chairman of this district for the Republican party, repeating an attack that was first made in Clackamas county.

1st. As Prof. Hawley is a lawyer, he must admit that this card is absolutely legal in character and in no sense a desecration unless we indict the whole national Republican committee for misusing the flag.

2nd. The evident intention of the card is of the highest order, namely, patriotic. It was the watchword of the campaign of 1904—"25,000 majority for Roosevelt."

3rd. There are no stars crowded out, as charged. The number of stars on the flag is the same as when the first Republican victory was won in 1860, and the old veterans bore the flag to victory under Lincoln, on the gory battlefields of the South in the civil war in their desperate struggle to keep all the stars there.

4th. The Hawley managers should be slow in attacking the patriotism of any man, especially a rival candidate, when they will only stir up memories of a lecture delivered by their candidate on John Brown of Ossawatimie, which was condemned by Grand Army men generally.

5th. Not a word of criticism was caused by the use of these cards in 1904, when many thousands were put in circulation to advertise Theodore Roosevelt and the Republican party, and when Mr. Tooze was not a candidate for Congress.

6th. Mr. Tooze has been popular with the Grand Army, has been their orator on many occasions, and will be in the future, while Mr. Hawley has not been so intensely popular since his John Brown speech.

The attack on Mr. Tooze coming from the Hawley managers is not going to hurt Mr. Tooze's candidacy with true men of any party. Its purpose is merely to enable him to defeat him on his merits as a man and a Republican personal misrepresentations and attacks must be resorted to.

COLLEGE HAS GOOD FRIENDS

President Coleman, of the University, made some announcements this morning at chapel exercises which were hailed with delight by the students. Four men, who refuse to allow their names to be made public, have made possible the following improvements: The painting of the main building and the gymnasium before commencement of the present year, the fitting up and rearranging of the museum, and the erection of a building for the College of Theology. In addition to this one man has agreed to make up any deficiency that may occur in the current expenses of the school for this year, and the financial affairs of the institution are better off by \$7100 than they were 33 days ago. Another announcement was to the effect that Bishop Moore had started a movement for the immediate raising of \$25,000 endowment and pledging to give the last \$500 of it himself.

"Not only watch, but help William-ette grow," were the closing words of his short address, which was teeming with enthusiasm and hope for the future of the old school.

The painting of the main building and the gymnasium are improvements that have been needed for some time, while the museum has been in a deplorable condition, although the collection contained therein is a large and valuable one. It will now be fitted up properly and put in shape that will make it of some use.

The man who expects to donate the money for the erection of a building for the theological department will present his proposition to the trustees when they meet in Portland, Wednesday, January 21st, and there is little doubt that his proposition will be accepted. In making this announcement President Coleman said that it had not yet been decided where the new building would be located, but he thought it might be appropriate to place it near the College of Medicine.

SALTON BASIN IS INLAND SEA

A San Francisco Chronicle representative has spent ten days investigating the conditions on the desert where the Colorado river is pouring into Salton basin. He reports that the flow of the Colorado and Gila rivers is pouring into the the Salton sea, the bed of which is 25 feet below the level of the sea. Below the point where the Colorado leaves the old channel the bed of the stream, which formerly emptied into the gulf of California, 80 miles away, is now as dry as dust.

Salton basin is rapidly becoming a great inland sea, which threatens to modify the climate of all southern California. Salton sea is now from 10 to 15 miles wide and 45 miles long, and in the deepest part has a depth of 24 feet, which is increasing at the rate of over half an inch a day. The area of the basin, which is below the sea level, is 2500 square miles.

If the flow of the Colorado is not controlled it will, in time, again fill the entire basin to sea level. At present the flow is about 9000 cubic feet a second, while the evaporation over the area now covered by water is one-hundredths of an inch to every 24 hours.

Where formerly stood the town of Salton, and the great salt works, the water is now 20 feet deep. Most of the buildings are gone and the others are rapidly going. It is well nigh impossible to turn the river back to its old channel, as the new channel is fully five feet below the level of the old bed.
