Gray's Harbor. In an article on Chehalis valley, the Seattle Chronicle says, that which may properly be termed a portion of the Chehalis valley, as it is the outlet of the river thence, is now attracting considerable attention. It is a miniature inland sea of salt water, connected with the Pacific ocean by a deep channel from one-half to three-quarters of a mile in width and a mile long.

These halibut were sold in the San Francisco market, and although good prices were said to have been realized, yet the voyage was an unprofitable one and the vessel was sold. Since that time no other vessel has been engaged in fishing on the banks of the Strait of Fuca, except occasionally for pastime. A tug boat will run off and take a few halibut and rock fish. The whole business on the American side is therefore, confined to the fisheries of the Makah Indians.

The halibut is a staple article of food for these Indians, and takes the place of the dried salmon of the interior tribes. The season commences in June, as soon as the far seal fishing is over, and continues at intervals till October, or, as late as the weather will permit canoes to go to the fishing grounds.

The villages of the Makah tribe are at Neah Bay, where is also the official residence of the Indian agent in charge, and the employes of the reservation, the whole of Cape Flattery being reserved by the government for the Indians. South of Flattery Rocks is the Quillente river, where a band of Indians of the same name reside. These belong to the Makah agency, and during the summer months some of them reside at the "warmlouses" for halibut fishing, adding to the number of fishermen. But the Quillente tribe as a general thing do not depend so much on the Halibut for food as the Makahs do. The Quillentes take quantities of salmon in the river and dry tons of surf smelt, which visit that locality in myriads during the summer months.

Henderson stated that he caught quite a number of large halibut, some of them measuring seven feet in length and weighing 250 pounds. These halibut were sold in the San Francisco market, and although good prices were said to have been realized, yet the voyage was an unprofitable one and the vessel was sold. Since that time no other vessel has been engaged in fishing on the banks of the Strait of Fuca, except occasionally for pastime. A tug boat will run off and take a few halibut and rock fish. The whole business on the American side is therefore, confined to the fisheries of the Makah Indians.

But the Quillente tribe as a general thing do not depend so much on the Halibut for food as the Makahs do. The Quillentes take quantities of salmon in the river and dry tons of surf smelt, which visit that locality in myriads during the summer months. The Makahs usually go to the banks in large sized canoes at the commencement of the season. These are the regular whaling canoes, and usually carry six Indians. As the season advances, and the weather becomes more settled, they go in smaller canoes with two or three men in each. Their usual time of starting is early in the morning at the top of high water. They then run out with the ebb tide, and on reaching the banks they fish until the return of the tide, and as soon as the current runs too strong to enable them to keep their lines on the bottom they start for home, and usually return late in the afternoon.
