There were 22 votes cast in this precinct. The state Republican ticket leads by 2. The county ticket is about even.

There were 756 votes cast in this precinct. At eleven o'clock there were 175 votes counted. The state ticket at that hour was about even, Hirsch running ahead. Kinsey was leading Reed about 20, the county ticket being Democratic by about 25.

There were 130 votes polled. At 11 o'clock the Republican state ticket was ahead; Reed was leading Kinsey 20 votes, Trenchard leading Spedden 20 votes, Twombly leading Welch the same. Progress was slow, as nearly every ticket was scratched.

4. Members of visiting lodges from Portland, The Dalles, Seattle, New Tacoma, Vancouver, Albany, Corvallis, Pendleton, Baker City, etc.
5. Officers and members of the Grand Lodge of Oregon.
6. Reception of Grand Lodge and visiting brethren by members of Astor Lodge.
7. Tournament about 4:30 p. m. on Chenamus street, near the Occident hotel.
8. Dedication of Castle Hall by officers of the Grand Lodge, ceremonies commencing at 8 p. m.
9. Oration by Hon. H. Y. Thompson.
10. Presentation of banners by Grand Chancellor D. E. Buchanman.
11. Grand uniform ball at the skating rink, commencing immediately after the conclusion of ceremonies at the hall. The new hall will be thrown open to those who prefer a pleasant social reunion after the dedication to tripping the light fantastic toe. Par-

rot's string band will furnish music for the ball.
Roscoe, the well-known caterer, will be found at Liberty Hall after 10 o'clock, where guests will find ample provision made for the inner man, for one dollar.

The Election.
The gray streaks of early dawn yesterday morning showed every dead-wall, corner and convenient drygoods box posted with flaming announcements concerning the proper action of the voter, and as the morning advanced, the clans gathered at the polling places, and the work began. The day was cool and cloudy, and a large vote was polled in an early hour. All sorts of tickets were in circulation, and the only way a sovereign elector could tell anything about it was by sitting down quietly and reading his ticket.

There was very little disturbance, no loud talking nor demonstrations of any kind; every one went up and voted and then went about his business. We never saw so much 'scratching' as was done yesterday, both Democrats and Republicans exercising their prerogative to an unusual extent.
The buses and cameries did a good business all day, their sides being ornamented with certain statements as to the necessity for political action. About the time the usual surge takes place, which generally happens about five minutes to six, the usual crowd of tongas started in to show what their idea of liberty was by trying to hold back the line of voters that were trying to get up to the poles. Some blows were struck, but the noisy ones were gathered in by the police and 'remonstrated' with. Owing to the inordinate amount of scratching, 'tis impossible at this writing to give any returns.

Generally Approved.
Considerable comment has been made on a recent article in THE ASTORIAN concerning fishing on the bar. Both cannermen and fishermen agree with Lieutenant Price's suggestion, viz: that fishing on the bar be prohibited. 'Tis just as fair for one as fair for another, is the general remark. The fishermen say it would suit them better to fish opposite the city and further up, but as one of them said to us, while sitting in his boat last Sunday morning, 'You can walk on coaks all over the bar; now there isn't one of us that's at the bar fishing out there, but what are you going to do? You put out your net, and here comes another right in front of you, and in front of him another swings in.' The cannermen say that it would be a big saving for them; that they are constantly losing nets, and sometimes boats. Although it would seem generally satisfactory to everyone, and 'tis probable that this is the last season when fishermen will imperil their lives upon the rough waters of the Columbia bar.

Found Drowned.
Eureka boat No. 17 came up from the bar yesterday morning with the dead body of Adolf Christensen, who has been missing since last Wednesday. Christensen, who was a man of steady habits, came down with his wood saw, as usual, on that day, and tied it up at Gray's dock. He had considerable money about him, and when he was missed the presumption was that he was murdered. Immediately after the arrival of the body, Coroner Franklin impudged a jury. The verdict will be rendered to-morrow afternoon, being delayed in order to procure evidence. The appearance of the body, and the fact that nothing of value was found on the deceased, indicates that there has been foul play. The deceased was a man of good character, a member of the Knights of Pythias and of Engine Co. No. 1, and was buried yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock from Castle Hall, his remains being followed to the grave by the members of both organizations.

Forest Fires.
During the last week a fire was out across Young's Bay that starting at first as a little smouldering mass, was fanned into a fierce flame by the dry winds from the east. Friday last, the scene as described by an eye-witness was grand. Great trees were clouds of smoke by day and pillars of fire by night. Crimson sheets of flame streamed out from giant pines and great heaps of burning moss blown through the air lodged in the tops of adjacent trees instantly converting them into a mass of flames that encircled the trunk and shot high in the air above. The roar of the flames was distinctly heard to town. Fortunately no great damage was done, though women in the immediate neighborhood had great difficulty in saving that which was cut and piled.
