THE U. S. SUPREME COURT.
An August Boly Whose Etiquette is Very Rigid.

The etiquette of the supreme court room is very rigid. Lawyers appearing before the court are given just so much time in which to present their arguments, and not one minute more is allowed them. No one is permitted to take notes of the proceedings outside of the lawyers inside the bar. This is particularly true upon decision day. If a spectator takes out a piece of paper to make a note he is instantly warned by a messenger that he must desist or leave the court-room. The reason of this is to avoid the sending out of incorrect statements about the position of the court.

There have been several propositions before the court to have its proceedings reported verbatim for benefit of the legal publications, but the court has always been against anything of the sort. They have held that it would be a needless waste of expense without any compensating advantages to the legal profession. Even where decisions are actually delivered they are often held back for weeks for polishing before publication. The etiquette of the court has been so rigidly maintained during its history that I am informed that there has only been one case of contempt of court since its establishment. This was a case where a man before the court was ordered to do something he could not do. He was fined \$250. This is the only sum that the court has derived from this source in its history.—*Chicago Tribune.*

A lawyer in Putman, Conn., was consulted by a woman the other day who desired a divorce, she left him a check for \$200, half of which is to be a "retainer," and the other \$100 she received in cash. The lawyer has since found the check worthless and the woman a fraud.

The company which built the capitol of Texas for 3,000,000 acres of land, sold it in a lot at \$3.50 per acre, or for \$10,500,000; and the capitol only cost \$3,500,000, leaving a clear profit of \$7,000,000.

It is reported that the proprietors of the land in the Texas Panhandle are selling large tracts to syndicates at 50 cents per acre, but are charging homesteaders for the same claims \$2 to \$3 per acre.

Enphatic Resolutions.

The Marion county grange has passed the following resolution: Whereas, There exists in Oregon a combination composed of the millers of Oregon, through whose control flour has been advanced in price not less than one dollar per barrel more than is reasonable, therefore, Resolved, That the attention of the next legislature be directed to the matter of extending the law regulating tolls to exchange wheat for flour. Resolved, That the fare on railroads be reduced to three cents per mile. We concur with Linn county in the adoption of resolutions in regard to agricultural colleges. Resolved, That we are opposed to the legislature making any appropriation to perfect the title of the agricultural college at Corvallis. Resolved, That the state of Oregon own and print its own school books, and that the law authorizing the change of all kinds of books by the several county superintendents be repealed.
