Farmersto Have "Trust."  
Lawton, Okla., Sept. 27.—Mississippi merchants and business men beginning to "view with alarm" the numerous activities of the state of the Farmers' union, and are endeavoring to have the cotton of the state will soon be driven into a "trust" that will drive out of business.  
The union has accomplished its purpose in raising the price of cotton, which has more than doubled since the union came into existence, the organization is now rapidly developing a community movement that will supply the members with practically every need. Already the union has arranged to establish a cooperative for the benefit of its members, and policies will be written for each in sums not exceeding \$1000.  
A central market agency is now in operation, but at present supplies members with only the necessities of life. Flour, meat and other commodities are being shipped direct to the members and manufacturers are cutting out the profit which usually goes to the retailers. It is expected that this plan will soon be extended to include luxuries as well as necessities, and that within a few months Mississippi farmers

will be buying everything they eat, use and wear through the central purchasing agency of the farmer's trust."

A fire insurance company controlled by the members of the union has been in existence several months and has placed a large volume of business.

The union now has a dozen organizers in the field and is rapidly extending its membership in every county of the state, until it appears likely that within a very short time nearly every Mississippi farmer will be enrolled in the ranks. The leaders in the movement state that 100,000 members are assured by the first of next year.

New warehouses are being built constantly in the principal cotton growing centers, and the union will soon be able to place in storage all of the cotton raised by its members, to be held until such time as the price demanded is offered.

As the membership in each community becomes sufficient to support such an institution, it is said to be the plan of the union leaders to establish co-operative stores, until the entire state has been covered with a network of mercantile establishments. That the union, conducted, as it is, along sound business lines, could purchase goods in such large quantities as to undersell other merchants; appears likely.

The officers declare that the Farmers' union is free from the defects that have made failures of so many other co-operative schemes.

To Open National Buffalo Park.  
Lawton, Okla., Sept. 27.—The high wire fence now being built around the buffalo park in the Wichita national game preserve, at a cost of \$35,000 is nearing completion, and the herd of 27 buffalo donated to the government by the American Bison society will be placed in the park some time next month. The animals are now at the New York zoological garden, but it is thought that the climate of southwestern Oklahoma and the freedom allowed by the big park are better adapted to the propagation and longevity.

Several buffalo have also been given to the government by Pawnee Bill and the Miller Brothers, owners of the "101" ranch, and these will be placed in the park. If the experiment proves successful the herd of buffalo now in Yellowstone national park will be transferred to

The Wichita national game preserve contains over 60,000 acres and is located in the mountainous district of southwestern Oklahoma, where it is believed the rapidly vanishing buffalo will thrive to the best advantage. Superintendent Frank Rush will go to New York next month for the zoo herd, and in the meantime, conditions will be made as nearly as possible like those under which the king of American beasts thrived on the prairies of the unsettled southwest and west. The spot chosen for the buffalo park is one of the most rugged in the Wichita mountains.

Many species of small game will be sent here by the government with the introduction of the buffalo.
