FIFTY-ONE BODIES RECOVERED

Jacobs Creek, Pa., Dec. 23.—Fifty-one bodies have been recovered from the mine where approximately 200 miners were entombed Thursday. This number was taken out before 11 o'clock today.

Exploring parties report 20 more ready to be brought to the surface. The work of locating the dead victims has progressed rapidly within the past few hours, and by tomorrow every square foot of the mine will have been searched. Governor Stuart will immediately appoint a relief committee of 15 to care for the needs of those who have been left destitute by the death of the heads of families.

WOODBURN HOP GROWERS WILL JOIN

(United Press Leased Wire.) Woodburn, Or., Dec. 23.—A very largely attended meeting of hop growers is in session here today, the first of a series of meetings for the purpose of combining and entering the Pacific Hop Growers' Union embracing the states of California, Oregon and Washington. Among those present are: Senator Edward F. Woodward, W. E. Loydale, M. H. Durst and Attorney A. L. Shinn, of California. The growers reported the number of bales raised by each in 1906-7 and how many are still on their hands. The legal aspect was presented by Attorney Shinn and the financial by Woodward. The growers decided to co-operate with the union of Sacramento, the head place of business, on account of the articles of incorporation which were taken out in that state. There will be five directors from each state, and each grower has one vote, irrespective of his acreage.

Two Hundred Strikers Killed.
(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Dec. 23.—Two hundred nitrate workers were killed by government troops at Iquique, Chile, Saturday, according to advices received here today.

When 10,000 workmen in the interior refused to disperse the troops opened fire with machine guns, and a state of siege was declared.

Twenty thousand strikers have made their way to the coast in a state

of panic. Trouble of the most serious nature is feared. The state department has no knowledge of any Americans being interested in the nitrate beds, which are largely worked by Englishmen and Germans.

"TARRYTOWN ON THE PIKE."

Play So Warm It Was Destroyed by Spontaneous Combustion.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Long Beach, Cal., Dec. 23.—"Tarrytown on the Pike," a new vaudeville theatre, was destroyed by fire, caused by spontaneous combustion, early this morning with losses aggregating about \$10,000, including the stock of a tobacconist store, located in the building. There was no insurance.

Lepers at Large.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Havana, Dec. 23.—Twenty-three lepers today escaped from the San Lazaro hospital. Four were recaptured, but the other 19 are still at large.

Rock Island Pleads Guilty.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, Dec. 23.—The Rock Island railway has changed its plea of not guilty to guilty in 32 cases against it for the putting of cattle in closed cars longer and 28 hours without food, rest or water. The Santa Fe, Northwestern, Great Western, Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul and the Illinois Central will follow the Rock Island's example in a total of 106 cases, recently brought by the government. The law provides for a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500 for each offense, but the roads will plead mitigating circumstances.
