## WELCOME TAFT TO NEW YORK MUCH ENTHUSIASM

REPUBLICAN NATIONAL STANDARD BEARER IS GIVEN ROUSING RECEPTION ALONG THE LINE.

(United Press Lensed Wire.)

New York, June 22.—William H. Taft was greeted with loud cheers when he arrived at the Pennsylvania station in Jersey City today and was given another ovation when he landed at the Twenty-third street ferry station. It was New York's first glimpse of Taft as the candidate and the reception was up to the expectations of the party leaders.

With Taft was Frank B. Kellogg, special counsel for the government in the suits against the Standard Oil company. They went directly to the Hotel Manhattan where they held a conference. Mrs. Taft and her daughter were at the Manhattan to greet the candidate.

At noon Taft left for New Haven, Conn., to attend the Yale commencement. He will go to New London to witness the Yale-Harvard boat races on Thursday.

From New London he will return to New York and will meet Luke E. Wright, the new secretary of war, here on Friday. Then he and Wright will go to Oyster Bay to confer with President Roosevelt. Taft expects to return to Washington Saturday and wind up his business at the war department and turn over the office to Wright.

The candidate today refused to discuss politics. He spoke in the highest praise of James S. Sherman, the vice presidential candidate, and greeted his interviewers with vigorous hand shakes and broad smiles. He said that he expects to spend September and October at his home in Cincinnati.

At New Haven, Conn., June 22.—"Hello Bill!" "He's Bill Taft today," "Big Bill of the class of '78" to the "Old Grads" who gathered at the station this afternoon to greet the Republican nominee for president of the United States. The crowds assembled here to attend the annual commencement exercises and take the tone that Taft belongs to them and they are so proud of him that they are planning to wake Old Eli up tonight with a demonstration that will be a history marker in campus history.

The members of the class of '78 are in charge of arrangements and they have served notice that it is going to be a "slam bang" affair. No set program has been arranged.

The presentation ceremonies of the senior class were held today, with the traditional oration, poem and class history, followed by the planting of the ivy on the campus.

## TWELVE MINERS KILLED

Paris, June 22.—Twelve miners were killed by a fire damp explosion at Stettienne today and many others were injured.

Details of the catastrophe are lacking so far and it is feared that the death list will be increased.

Relief trains with doctors and hospital supplies have been rushed to the scene.

### ABE RUEF SUBMITS BONDS AMOUNTING TO \$840,000

San Francisco, June 22.—Abe Ruef, indicted ex-convict, who spent the last year of his life in jail, today submitted to District Attorney Langdon the list of the property holders and the amount of bonds they have subscribed for his bail which he hoped to have accepted by the court some time this week.

The list of bondsmen submitted by Ruef contains the names of many prominent politicians here. The total bonds run up to \$840,000 and the total amount of property owned by the bondsmen is over \$3,000,000.

Langdon and Ruef engaged in a spat over the names of Ruef's father and sister which appeared in the list.
