## APATHY

The most noteworthy feature of the closing days of the campaign in the light of the possibility of Bryan's success, which apparently has seized the country.

The first effect has been to provide the Republican campaign managers with more money than they dreamed of getting.

The second effect has been to set a considerable part of the business interests of the country actively against Bryan. The apathy among business men has disappeared.

The struggle has now become one between the Republicans with wealth and business as coadjutors against the Democracy with organized labor, or a part of it, and the employed as the chief auxiliary.

With plenty of money on hand and the business interests changing their previous attitude of indifference, the Taft leaders no longer fear the outcome despite the probable loss of Ohio and Indiana.

### THREE TO ONE THAT

### TAFT WILL BE WINNER

New York, Oct. 29.—EBTs that Taft will be elected are being placed today in the financial district at odds of three to one on the Republican candidate. The cotton exchange people who are wagering money are laying odds that Hughes will be elected but there is more Chanler money in sight that there is Bryan money.

No money is being wagered on the gubernatorial fight that either candidate will carry the state by any stated vote. The Chanler men are getting odds of 9 to 10 and 8 to 10.

Two bets of \$100 each have been recorded so far that Bryan will get more electoral votes this year than he did in 1896. These bets were made at even money. One bet of \$500 has been made that Bryan will carry the United States by a plurality of 10,000.

## COURT HOUSE NEWS

A suggestion will be introduced at the next meeting of the county court by Judge Bushey relative to the difficulties encountered by the county court in distributing funds for the improvements and building of county roads.

Judge Bushey would recommend that each and every district for which the Marion county road fund is expended, tax itself in accordance with the amount of money the respective district will require to improve or re-build their roads for the year, and that the county court allot the district the amount of road money which their taxes call for and no more.

By doing this the judge thinks each district will not make application for funds beyond their means, which seems to be the principal trouble at the present time.

J. H. Patton, of Silverton, has made application to the county court asking for appointment as road supervisor of the Victor Point district, to fill the vacancy made recently by the resignation of Former Road Supervisor Ben Funnue. Mr. Patton has had experience with roads, he being a prominent farmer in the Silverton district, and the court it is expected will give him the office.

Road Supervisor C. S. Ficklin, of district No. 29, in Fruitland vicinity, appeared before Judge Bushey yesterday and asked the county surveyor to be instructed to survey a portion of road in his district over which there has been a dispute regarding adjacent property holders' lines. # ADMITS ATTEMPT TO BRIBE ANOTHER 'FRISCO GRAFT EXPOSE

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Oct. 29.—E. A. S. Blake, a local contractor confessed at noon today to the crime of attempting to bribe John M. Kelly, a ventureman called to sit on the jury that is to try Abraham Ruef, ex-political boss of San Francisco, on a charge of bribery.

Blake's confession has created a tremendous sensation here. He implicates Attorneys Frank J. Murphy and A. S. Newburgh who have been appearing for Ruef in the "graft cases."

Blake said that Attorney Murphy gave him \$100 to offer Kelly. Blake claims that Ruef offered him \$10,000 after he was arrested to keep silent on the case and exhibits a promissory note said to be signed by Ruef for that amount.

Blake was tried and convicted of the attempt to bribe and was to have been sentenced today. It is understood that he will not be sent to jail in return for his confession.

# UNLAWFUL ON ELECTION DAY

It is unlawful on election day—  
To hire vehicles to haul voters to and from the polls;  
To hire any one to work at the polls, except to challenge persons not qualified to vote;

To wear any political badge or insignia at the polls;  
To distribute cards or campaign literature at the polls; or to work at the polls in any way to influence voters;

To do anything to influence voters;  
Under the terms of Oregon's new corrupt practice act, passed by the people in June, the Presidential election November 3 will be just a plain election, without any frills—nothing but the polls, the election board and the voters. The time-honored gauntlet of political workers handing out cards which the voter has always to run, is now illegal.

The reluctant voter who has waited for his party enthusiasts to hunt him out and take him to the polls in carriage or hack must walk, pay car fare, or stay away. No person is permitted to use any effort, at the polls or away from them, on election day to influence the vote of any one. Some sections of the corrupt practices act relating to election day follow:

"It shall be unlawful for any person to pay another for any loss or damage due to attendance at the polls, or in registering, or for the expense of transportation to or from the polls.

"No person shall pay for personal service to be performed on the day of any election, for any purpose connected therewith, except for the hiring of persons whose sole duty is to act as challengers, and watch the count of official ballots.

"No person shall buy, sell, give or provide any political badge, button or other insignia to be worn at or about the polls on the day of any election, and no such political badge, button or other insignia shall be worn at or about the polls on any election day.

"It shall be unlawful for any person at any place on the day of any election to ask, solicit or in any manner try to induce or persuade any voter on such election day to vote for or refrain from voting for any candidate or the candidates or ticket of any political party or organization."

The last section above quoted would prohibit the banners, heretofore common, bearing the legend, "Vote the Straight Republican Ticket." In fact, this section prohibits all political activities on election day which would in any manner tend to influence a voter as to how he should vote.

# FAMOUS ABOLITIONIST ASPHYXIATED BY GAS

Lynn, Mass., Oct. 29.—John W. Hutchinson, aged 87, poet, vocalist and friend of Lincoln, Garrison and other noted Abolitionists, was asphyxiated at his home, Tower Cottage, High Rock. He was found by his wife, lying unconscious, face downward near a door toward which he had crawled in a effort to escape gas leaking from a heater. Although medical aid was summoned, he died within an hour.

John Wallace Hutchinson was known all over the United States as a famous singer, Abolitionist, temperance reformer and advocate of woman suffrage. He was born in Milford, New Hampshire in 1821.

During the time of the Civil War his parents and their 13 children formed, under the name of The Hutchinson Family, a quartette of vocalists, composed of John, Judson, Asa and Abby. Before the war they sang in the North and West. Their songs were an appeal to the people to favor abolition and temperance. The Hutchinson family also sang into Republican campaigns of 1855 and 1860.

After war was declared, they visited the army of the Potomac and were expelled. They were later admitted by personal order of President Lincoln and were afterwards singers among dactive workers as nurses in hospitals and camps.

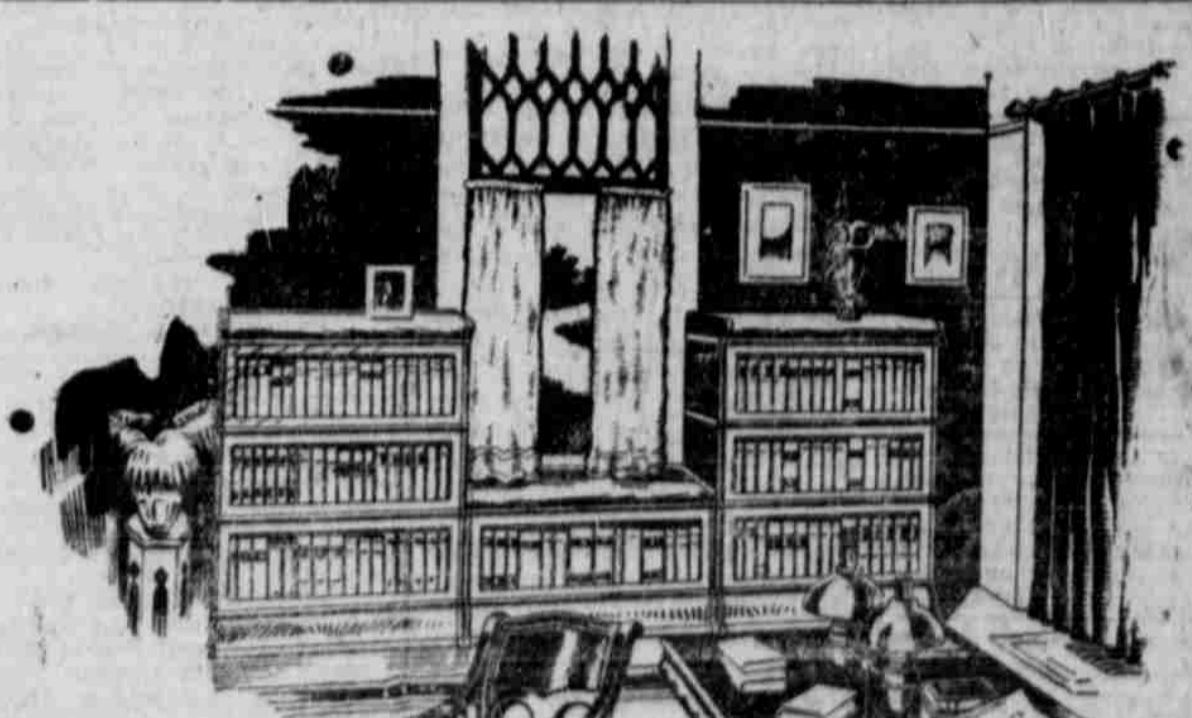
