

GUBERNATORIAL CONTEST

New York, Nov. 4.—Many contests still remaining in doubt, mark the results of the gubernatorial races over the country and some of them may not be settled for several days.

The victory of Governor Hughes by 50,000 over Lieutenant Governor Lewis Staynesant Chanler is one of the big surprises of the election. He developed unexpected strength up-state, overcoming the plurality given Chanler in the city.

Johnson, the Republican, probably has been elected in North Dakota over Burke, the Democrat.

Governor Warner, of Michigan, probably has been defeated by L. T. Hemans, the Democrat, though the state is safely Republican. Chances favor the election of the Democrats in the hot contests in Indiana, Nebraska and Minnesota.

Governor John A. Johnson has been re-elected in Minnesota but by a reduced plurality. Marshall, Democrat, has carried Indiana under remarkable circumstances, as the state went for Taft and all other Democrats on the state ticket were beaten. Shallenberger probably is winner in Nebraska though it is still in doubt.

Governor Davidson, Republican has carried Wisconsin, according to the returns today.

Other governors elected are: Ansel, Democrat, South Carolina; Vessey, Republican, South Dakota; Patterson, Democrat, Tennessee; Campbell, Democrat, Texas; Spry, Republican, Utah; Cosgrove, Republican, Washington; Glasscock, Republican, West Virginia.

In Missouri the race between Hadley, Republican and Cowherd, Democrat, is doubtful and the result cannot be predicted positively. The same condition exists in Ohio where Harmon, Democrat, and Harris, Republican, both claim election.

Mormon Carry Everything.
Salt Lake, Utah, Nov. 4.—Returns today show Utah overwhelmingly Republican. The Republican ticket carries Utah county with pluralities ranging from 5000 to 8000. The mormons combined against the anti-Mormon or "American" party and showed them up. Not an official was elected on the anti-Mormon ticket.

Pacific Grove, Cal., Nov. 4.—Eleven precincts out of 28 in Monterey county gave Taft 1370, Bryan 750, Needham, Republican, for congress, 1230, Feliz 900.

Defeat Anti-Graft Judge.
San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Two hundred and seventy-five precincts out of 300 in San Francisco, give Judge Frank H. Danne, Democratic and Good Government league nominee for superior judge a substantial plurality. Returns from these precincts indicate that Judge Carroll Cook, Republican, has been defeated by a big vote. Cook was opposed by Attorney Francis J. Heney and other leaders of the graft prosecution.

Missouri Republican.
Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 4.—Cowherd, Democrat, this afternoon conceded the election of Hadley, Republican, his opponent for governor of Missouri.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 4.—Taft's plurality in North Dakota according to late returns today will reach 30,000. The pluralities on the Republican state ticket, with the exception of Johnson (Republican) for governor, range from 7000 to 20,000.

Marshall leads in the Republican primary for nomination to the senatorship and his election is conceded.

Bryan Still Waiting.
Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 4.—Bryan slept soundly last night and arose this morning at 8 o'clock, apparently refreshed and in good spirits. After reading the morning papers, he said that he would await more complete returns from Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia and Nebraska before commenting on the outcome of the election.

Toledo Taft Plurality.
Toledo, O., Nov. 4.—Official returns today show Bryan gaining in Lucas county. Taft, however, will probably receive a plurality of 2,000.

Minnesota 100,000.
St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 4.—Taft's plurality, as approximated from today's returns, will reach 100,000 in Minnesota. This is 21,000 less than Roosevelt polled four years ago.

Johnson (Dem) will be elected governor by from 8000 to 12,000 plurality. For congress Hammond (Dem) defeated McCleary (Rep) by about 1500. The remaining eight congressmen are Republicans.

California.
San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Returns from all over the state indicate that Taft will have a plurality of 75,000 in California. Reports from the mountain counties, coming in slowly, out down the immense lead of the Republican candidate, but it seems certain that he will have at least 75,000.

"We will have a plurality of 75,000 easily," said General George Stone, state Republican manager. "This election shows that California is safely Republican, and cannot be won over to the Democrats."

Secretary Murray, of the Democratic state central committee, said today:

"It is hard to understand. We fought a good fight and thought that

we would carry the state. Counties that should have given us majorities went the other way. It was evidently a Republican landslide."

San Francisco Nov. 4.—Returns from all portions of the state this afternoon indicate that Harry A. Melvin, Republican, has been elected justice of the supreme court over Frank J. Murasky, Democrat, by a majority of 27,000.

Melvin ran behind his ticket because of the big majority given to Judge Murasky in San Francisco.

Columbus, O., Nov. 4.—Noon returns indicate a plurality of 80,000 for Taft. Harmon (Dem.) will probably be elected governor but the rest of the state ticket will be Republican.

New York, Nov. 4.—Taft's largest vote was in New York, where from late reports it was estimated he had received a plurality of 216,398, exceeding the landslide plurality of Roosevelt four years ago. Taft's big eastern vote was a surprise to his managers who declare their delight at the result.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 4.—President Roosevelt today declared that the election of Taft was a "triumph over unwise and improper radicalism, as Taft's nomination was a triumph over reactionary conservatism."

Indiana Democratic
Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 4.—Congressman Overstreet today admitted his defeat by Charles A. Kernly (Dem.), and Congressman Landis admitted his defeat by Morrison (Dem.) by 264 votes. This will give the Democrats nine congressmen and 13 state senators. The Republican committeemen are admitting that the legislature will be Democratic and that a Democrat will succeed Hemenway (Rep.) in the United States senate.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 4.—Late returns indicate that W. T. Jamison will probably defeat Congressman W. P. Hepburn (Rep.). Republicans are claiming to have evened matters by the election of Kendall (Rep.) over Hamilton (Dem.).

MARYLAND GOES OVER TO BRYAN COLUMN
New York, Nov. 4.—The Republican state central committee today conceded Maryland to Bryan. The state has 8 electoral votes. Late reports show that hundreds of votes were thrown out on account of complications in the balloting system. Until this evening Chairman Hitchcock and other Republican leaders were confident the state had been swung for Taft.

REPUBLICANS LOSE IN CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE
San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Returns from all the legislative districts in the state indicate that the Republicans will have reduced majorities in both the assembly and the senate at the next session of the legislature. The Democrats have elected 13 members out of 80 in the assembly, with several more districts doubtful. The Democrats have also elected three senators, which will give them ten members out of 40 in the senate.

IOWA RETURNS TO REPUBLICAN RULE
Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 4.—The Republicans of the state are "getting together" today in a general movement for harmony, following the nomination of Governor A. B. Cummins for United States senator at the primary yesterday, and the election of Taft and Governor Carroll, giving the party its former power in the state.

It is thought that the election of Cummins will put an end to the bitter feud that has been conducted so long between the stand-patters and the progressives in the party. It is believed the trouble that kept the legislature deadlocked for weeks this fall will not reappear.

Returns today indicate that the estimated Republican plurality of 40,000 probably was too low.

THE UNITED STATES SENATORIAL RESULTS
Chicago, Ill., Nov. 4.—The Republican national congressional committee declared late today that, as a result of the legislative election, the following states would be left with one Republican and one Democratic senator in the United States senate: Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Kentucky, Nevada and Oregon.

The following will have two Democratic senators in the upper house: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and West Virginia.

PROBABLE NEW TAFT CABINET
Washington, D. C., Nov. 4.—It is presumed that the first official announcement by Taft will be the appointment of a new cabinet. Following are some of the suggested present aspirants:

ACCUSED OF BUYING FOR HUNDRED VOTES

Albuquerque, N. M., Nov. 4.—Accused of buying four hundred votes, J. Porter Jones, secretary of the territorial Republican committee is under arrest today.

JAPS ARE PLEASED WITH ELECTION RESULTS

Tokio, Nov. 4.—All Japan is delighted today at the outcome of the presidential election in the United States, and the local papers in various cities issued extras announcing the victory of Judge Taft. The Japanese are particularly pleased at the endorsement of the administration of President Roosevelt, whom they look upon as their good friend.

President-elect Taft is well remembered and much admired in Japan, many references to his visit to this country last year being published today.

The fact that the Democratic party on the Pacific coast made an issue of Japanese exclusion also makes the source a result of gratification, as the people consider it a rebuke by their American friends, who, the visit of the fleet has led them to believe are in the majority.

WASHINGTON REPUBLICANS ESTIMATED TOO LOW

Seattle, Nov. 4.—Washington state has joined in the landslide for Taft. The heavy vote and the slow count makes it impossible to determine accurately the extent of the Republican victory, but it is certain that Washington gives Taft a plurality of at least 45,000 exceeding by 15,000 the preliminary estimate of State Chairman DeBruler. The entire Republican state ticket is elected by a majority; that run well up with the presidential ticket; that the legislature is overwhelmingly Republican although one Democrat gets in from Stevens county, possibly a Democratic senator from Mason, Kitsap and Island. There is no doubt that Wesley L. Jones will be elected to the United States senate next January to succeed Senator Ankeny.

The state ticket falls but little below the Taft vote. County tickets are generally Republican. Here and there a few Democratic officials have got in some of the eastern Washington counties, but they are exceptions. It is estimated that at least 186,000 votes were cast in the state. The Democrats made their chief showing on Bryan. The Socialists cast approximately 12,000 votes, as nearly as can be determined with returns which show only about 40 per cent of the votes cast. The Prohibitionists made their usual showing and cast probably about 3500 votes.

MAKES FAST RIDE TO ESCAPE LYONING

Yreka, Cal., Nov. 4.—After an exciting night ride to escape a crowd of Portuguese laborers, bent on lynching him, Denny Hazel, convicted of the murder of Joseph Silva, a Portuguese farmer, today reached the jail here, from which he escaped last Monday.

Hazel wandered through the country until forced by hunger to ask food at the home of J. L. Crenshaw last night. Crenshaw gave him something to eat, and then notified the sheriff at Yreka. The news of Hazel's capture reached the Portuguese laborers, and a lynching party was formed.

Hazel begged Crenshaw to take him to the jail, and Crenshaw, heavily armed, set out. He was met by deputy sheriffs, and, after a fast ride, Hazel was safely landed in jail.
