**JAMES BRYCE, THE ENGLISH AMBASSADOR, DELIVERS LECTURE**

(United Press Leased Wire.) Berkeley, Cal., March 26.—Considered today one of the world's greatest thinkers on questions of social economics and world history, James Bryce, British ambassador to the United States, has aroused great interest and discussion here by his lecture before the faculty and students of the Pacific Theological seminary in Hearst hall last night. He spoke of "Relations of ethics and religion before the appearance of Christianity," and in part said:

"We understand religion to mean the conception man forms of the Deity, his idea of his own relation to the unseen power that governs the universe. By ethics or morality will be understood man's conception of his relation to his fellow creatures and of the duties he owes them. The results of this view of his relation to others appears in the conduct of his life. That conduct is also influenced by his religious beliefs; so the subject to be considered is the influence of both taken together on the actual conduct and behavior of men."

"Most of us now think religion and morality to be practically inseparable. But this has not always been so. There have been religions in which there was very little morality, faiths in which belief had told very little upon practice. There have been systems of morality which could hardly be said to rest upon religion, systems at any rate, in which the idea of any Deity to whom man was responsible was extremely faint and dim."

"In order to understand the influence which Christianity has exerted on morality it is necessary to know something of the religions and ethical systems of the ancient world before Christianity appeared."

"Before Christianity ethics were a central power in the activities of man. We find plenty of schools of philosophy, many schools of thought, many conceptions of a Deity, but in all the writings of the ancients we find an appreciation of the influence of moral power. Plato may not have believed in our divinity, but he had a definite conviction of a divine power and a well defined conception of the moral relation of man to man."

**WASHINGTON WINS DEBATE OVER U. OF O.**  
University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., March 26.—Those who heard the debate between the University of Oregon and the University of Washington last night are unanimous today in the declaration that the victory won by the Washington debaters is one that they should be proud of. The vote of the judges was two to one in their favor. Oregon supported the affirmative

side of the question: "Resolved, That, waiving constitutionality, the federal government should impose a progressive income tax on all incomes above a certain specified amount."

The surprise of the debate was the action of the Washington debaters in upsetting Oregon's argument by turning the issue on the question of a proportional tax. The local men were not prepared for such a turn, so that their argument for a progressive tax became weak.

H. L. James was the leader of the Washington team and Jesse H. Bond headed the other side.

**JOINES MAY YET GO TO THE WHITE SOX**

Seattle, March 26.—The reports from Portland that Fielder Jones, the great baseball manager and player, is irretrievably lost to the Chicago White Sox are not entirely correct, according to a statement made by Owner Charles Comiskey today.

Comiskey says that the matter was not definitely settled at the meeting he held with Jones in Portland yesterday. Jones told Comiskey that, if it was possible for him to get away from his business in the Oregon city, he would return and lead the White Sox for one year more.

The "Old Roman" denies the story sent out from Portland to the effect that Jones offered him \$250,000 for a half interest in the Chicago club.

Comiskey today announced that the White Sox will spend two weeks in Seattle during their training period next spring, arriving here March 24, and playing a series of games with President Dougdale's team. Using this city as a base of operations they will visit Tacoma and Vancouver
