**SUGGESTIVE QUESTIONS ON THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON BY REV. DR. LNSCOTT FOR THE INTERNATIONAL NEWSPAPER BIBLE STUDY CLUB.**

Temperance Lesson, Rom. xiii:8-14  
Golden Text—Put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ.—Rom. xiii:14.

Verses 8.—Is it always sinful to go into debt, when you have no visible means of paying it?  
Is it right, or wrong, to go into debt when you have nothing to pay with, if your creditor knows your circumstances?

Is a business man who has honestly failed in business and given up all he has to his creditors, under moral obligation to pay the balance of the debt, if he makes enough money to do so out of future business?

Under modern business conditions, and the law of love and righteousness, when wholesalers sell on time, or give an adequate discount for cash to retailers, why are not the debts of an honest bankrupt retailer, the legitimate loss of his creditors in common with himself?

Wherein consists the folly and sin of a wage-earner in constant work, getting into debt?

Is it the duty of everybody to love everybody, the bad and the good, enemies and friends?

What is the advantage of loving everybody, to ourselves, and to those whom we love?

Verses 9-10.—Give reasons, outside of the Bible, that will cover all circumstances, why it is always wrong to disobey these five moral prohibitions. (This question must be answered in writing by members of the club.)

Must all such acts, as are here forbidden, contravene the law of love to make them sinful; for example, if you had to kill a man who was about to kill one of your loved ones, would that be sinful?

Can an act be wrong that works out for the good of all parties?

Verses 11-12.—If you knew you had to die inside of a month, what effect would that have upon your intentions and actions, so far as God is concerned; and if it would change these in the least, does that not prove that you are now living wrong and are in danger?

Most people are morally and spiritually asleep, and many are far into the night; what are the conditions which should suddenly startle such into full consciousness, as to their danger, and their duty?

Verses 13.—How is it that the night is the time selected for so many bad deeds?

Should a man ever do a thing which he is ashamed for his best

friends and neighbors to know?

Does the popular conscience generally or always represent God's attitude to a thing; or are there some things God may be pleased with which the community would condemn as wrong, or vice versa?

How is it that bar rooms are generally screened off from the public gaze?

Why is it a crime for a man to get drunk?  
Why do most drunkards get drunk in the night, or away from public gaze?

Does the drink habit generally lead to the other four grave evils mentioned in verse thirteen?

Verses 14.—What is the sure remedy for the drink habit, and all kindred evils of the flesh?

Does putting on Jesus, always mean putting on strength so we can control all the passions of the body, and the ambitions of the soul?

**HARRIMAN DOCTORS GETTING ALARMED**

Vienna, June 26.—Professor Strumpell, an eminent specialist of this city, today is on his way to Sommering, the mountain health resort, where E. H. Harriman is staying, for a consultation with the physicians who are attending the railroad magnate. According to reports that have been brought to this city, Harriman's condition is more serious than is generally known, and his physicians have exhibited signs of anxiety.

The peculiar stiffening and contractions of the spinal muscles, which caused Harriman much pain and worry during his ocean voyage, are little improved. The physicians believe that, while his condition cannot be cured completely, it can be relieved. Harriman is submitting to a succession of electrical and cold water treatments at Sommering.

**JAPANESE TAKING CALIFORNIA ORCHARDS**  
Yuba City, Cal., June 26.—Orchardists of Sutter county are much alarmed at the rapid inroads being made in their field of business by

Japanese. Within the last month several of the finest orchards in this vicinity have been taken over on long term leases by Japanese orchardists, and the successful policy of exclusion to Asiatic growers, followed in this section for years, has been shattered.

Yesterday Charles Wilbur, owner of one of the most productive orchards in the county, was approached with a tempting offer for a long lease of his property. The men who made the proposition were Japanese, who traveled in a luxurious touring car, and announced that they had been successful in acquiring, for a period of several years, several of the finest orchards of the county.

**KILLED BY WAGON AS WAS HIS FATHER**

New Westminster, B. C., June 26.—Frank Bowell, a prominent young man of this city, is dead today as a result of injury he sustained yesterday, when he was run over by his own wagon.

A peculiar coincidence of the tragedy is found in the fact that a year ago Bowell's father was killed in the same manner, and by the running away of the same team of horses.

**G. A. R. MAN ROASTS UNCLE SAMUEL**

Oakland, Cal., June 26.—Captain W. R. Thomas, leading Grand Army man and former mayor of Oakland, is preparing a communication to Commander Daubenspeck of the California G. A. R., which will voice the sentiments of the old soldiers of the bay regarding the treatment received by the inmates of the veterans' home at Sawtelle.

Thomas is not backward in expressing his indignation at the treatment given by the nation to the men sought to prevent its dissolution. He said today:

"It's a burning shame that the old soldiers at the Sawtelle home are compelled to eat bread of charity and live on food solicited by the women of the relief corps of Los Angeles. It's a disgrace to the American nation.

"The records show that the old soldiers are dying at a rate of 2500 a month. Soon they will all be gone, and now is the time to show some appreciation to the invaluable services they rendered."
