LEAGUE ALLOWS MEMBERS EXERCISE INHERENT RIGHT

Members of the Good Government League, a local political organization may exercise their inherent right under the constitution and vote as they please. The G. G. League so declared itself in a resolution at a meeting held Friday evening. The League took this stand following a wrong session regarding a candidate for mayor in which C. E. Gates and J. W. Mitchell were endorsed, the League failing to agree on which man they wanted. About 100 members were present. The committee on membership appointed to canvass the city for members were called upon for a report. The chairman of the committee reported that 300 signatures to the platform had been secured, one member of the committee, Mr. Wilson, having alone secured 96 signatures. Dr. Hedges, chairman of the committee appointed to secure the endorsement of the several candidates for mayor and councilmen to the resolutions adopted by the League, reported that all of the candidates had been seen and that none of them had signed the League's platform. Then came a stormy session, the league endorsing two majority candidates but none for the city council. Candidate Gates explained his position in regard to the platform and although it was charged by a Mitchell supporter that he was not invited, he said he believed that it was

his privilege to appear and explain his stand which he did. From remarks made by certain of the speakers it was indicated that the Good Government League was originally a Mitchell movement and that his supporters had formed it to advance his candidacy.
