LIFT WHITE SLAVE CHARGE AGAINST CUMMINGS

Bert Cummings, indicted by the last grand jury on a charge of white slavery, begins the New Year outside of jail, through a humanitarian move on the part of the authorities. Thursday Prosecuting Attorney R. F. Mulkey moved that the one-time friend of Mike Spanos be released upon his own recognizance. This was done because of the extremely delicate condition of his wife, and that the accused might be able to contribute to her support. The indictment, however, still hangs over Cummings pending good behavior.

F. W. Burke, alleged to have committed a statutory offense upon a 17-year-old brotherless girl in the south end of the county, was allowed to plead guilty to a charge of simple assault, and will be sentenced later. This action was taken partly through lack of evidence, but mostly to spare the complaining witness the pains and pangs of the notoriety that would be attached to the case.

The case of Jim Ling, the Ashland Chinaman, accused of an assault upon Wo Lee, a Medford Mongolian, in which Laura White, an alleged white slave girl, was involved, was dismissed upon motion of District Attorney Mulkey. A jury at a previous term had disagreed on the case.

The Coles, mother and daughter, charged with an assault upon William Daley, a Lake Creek pioneer, last spring, following a dispute in which the father played a part, was continued until the next term.

This closes the criminal docket for the year and numbers therein the most important official acts of the retiring prosecutor, R. F. Mulkey, who will turn over the office next Monday to Prosecutor-elect E. E. Kelly.
