PORTLAND, Jan. 13.—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle, 1,131; calves, 13; hogs, 7184; sheep, 3226; horses, 20.

Cattle liquidation this week has been for short of supplying trade requirements. Killers show a keen desire for prime beef, but are not over-looking medium grades, so urgent is the call. Heavy fed steers to strong & \$7.50 to \$7.75, fully a quarter higher than previous market prices.

The mutton market is steady to a shade higher and the tendency is decidedly upward. Receipts have been unsatisfactory and anxious buyers are bidding stronger prices for prime ewes and wethers.

FOR MAYOR. As there seems to be a question in the minds of some people as to where I stand with reference to certain matters pertaining to the welfare of the city, I wish to make the following statement:

I was the first member of the council to advocate a public market, and, after writing many letters to cities in the east and middle west, to get data, a public market was finally established.

As to the saloons, I believe that so long as the citizens of Medford vote for license and the saloon men obey the regulations (which I think should be strict) they are entitled to fair treatment.

I believe that the regular police force can, and should, safeguard and protect those who would go astray, so far as it is possible to do so, and that until the city becomes larger, a police matron is unnecessary.

I believe the city should have a thorough business administration, with "Economy" the "Watchword"; the same methods should be applied and the same attention given to the business affairs of the city that any good business man gives to his private business.

I believe in the strict enforcement of law, and any police officer, who fails or neglects to do his duty should be removed.

Our water rates should be revised so that the cost of maintenance, and the necessary contributions to the sinking fund may be equitably distributed among the consumers, but no surplus should be accumulated at the expense of the rate payer.

Should they persist in disobeying the law, their license should be revoked.

Due consideration of all petitions for and against public improvements. A rigid practice of economy, except when such economy has a tendency to retard progress.

I will further all progressive matters of general improvement for the city, but such must come within the scope of good business.

I shall endeavor to use my best efforts for the keeping of the city in a sanitary condition at all times.

Whereas, after years of struggle, the women have been given the privilege of exercising their rights of citizenship, due consideration will be given them on all matters of public importance. Should I be elected, I assure the people that I will be mayor in fact as well as name.

I will not be the tool of any clique, and will be influenced only by what I believe to be right and equitable.
