RAU BUYS HOTEL DIAMOND AT CHICO

Articles of incorporation of the Diamond Hotel company were officially filed today by Attorney Richard White, says the Chico Enterprise. Chico is the principal place of business. The capital stock is fixed at \$15,000 divided into shares of the par value of \$100 each.

The sum of \$5200 is actually subscribed as follows: W. P. Rau, \$5000; George E. Kremer, \$100; Donald McLain, \$100. McLain's stock will be transferred in a few days to J. P. Clark, a Los Angeles lawyer, who was unable to be here. McLain permitted his name to be used in order to facilitate the organization of the company.

There are still ninety-eight shares of stock in the treasury of the company, and if Rau and his associates cannot conduct the hotel on the basis they desire, more stock will be sold in order to increase the hotel facilities, even to enlarging and modernizing to a greater extent.

The hotel office has been moved to the west side of the building, or in the space formerly used as a grill lobby and orchestra room. Rau will remove all of the hotel boxes and have sample rooms for traveling men in the hotel instead of in Third street, as under the old regime.

INTERSTATE BRIDGE MEETS OPPOSITION

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17.—Strong opposition to the proposed interstate bridge over the Columbia river between Portland and Vancouver is today indicated on the appearance in the house of Representative Latta's joint resolution calling for the appointment of a joint committee to confer with a similar committee from the state of Washington in regard to the building of such a bridge.

Representative Dimick led the opposition. He said the resolution would be followed by a bill for constructing the bridge, and the time to kill it is at the beginning. He asserted that the "masses" are not in favor of the bill, and said he had been told that agitation for it comes from real estate men in Portland.

Representative Linn came to the defense of Portland and denounced the idea of sectionalism.

The joint resolution was carried.
