HOUSE FAILS TO OVERRIDE VETO

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—By a vote of 213 to 114 the house today refused to override President Taft's veto of the Dillingham-Burnett immigration bill. The senate yesterday voted to enact the measure over the president's veto.

Congressman Goldfogel of New York defended President Taft's stand against the bill, saying: "The literacy test is most unfair and un-American."

Congressman Cannon said the bill had been previously "passed by both houses in defiance of patriotic and wise judgment."

10 MILES AN HOUR FOR AUTOS ON BRIDGES

Because it was understood that those East Main street property owners who had curbs already placed when the street to Roosevelt avenue was paved would not be assessed for same, a number of property owners protested to the city council last evening that they had been assessed the same as those who did not have curbs.

Earl Huntley acted as their spokesman and succeeded in having the matter referred to the street committee for adjustment.

Automobiles and vehicles are prohibited from traveling at a speed exceeding over 10 miles an hour across city bridges by an ordinance passed by the council. It is also made unlawful to drive any animal over the bridges faster than a walk.

accepted this afternoon by congress. The plans of the legislators to have physicians adjudge him insane and order his commitment to an asylum for the criminal insane until peace once more has been firmly established, reached Madero early today.

He received the news with bowed head but made no comment. Madero, close friends say, will accept the banishment plan without a protest, probably taking up his residence in the United States.

American in Favor

Diaz went in person to the United States embassy today to formally ratify his agreement with General Huerta.

Anti-American sentiment has disappeared, and the American embassy's automobile is cheered in the streets whenever it flashes by. It was this automobile, with a messenger bearing a white flag, which conveyed General Diaz' message of peace to General Huerta last night after the arrest of Madero.

Confiscate Madero Estate

Generals Diaz and Huerta met at the American embassy and pledged themselves to co-operate in reconstruction plans. The crowd there cheered Ambassador Wilson and the American flag.

It was reported this afternoon that the estates of the Madero family will be confiscated. Marco Hernandez, brother of the deposed minister of the interior, shouted "Viva Madero" when rurales demanded that he shout "Viva Huerta." He was shot and killed.

The building containing Madero's official newspaper was wrecked today. Troops control the city and have orders to shoot looters on sight.
