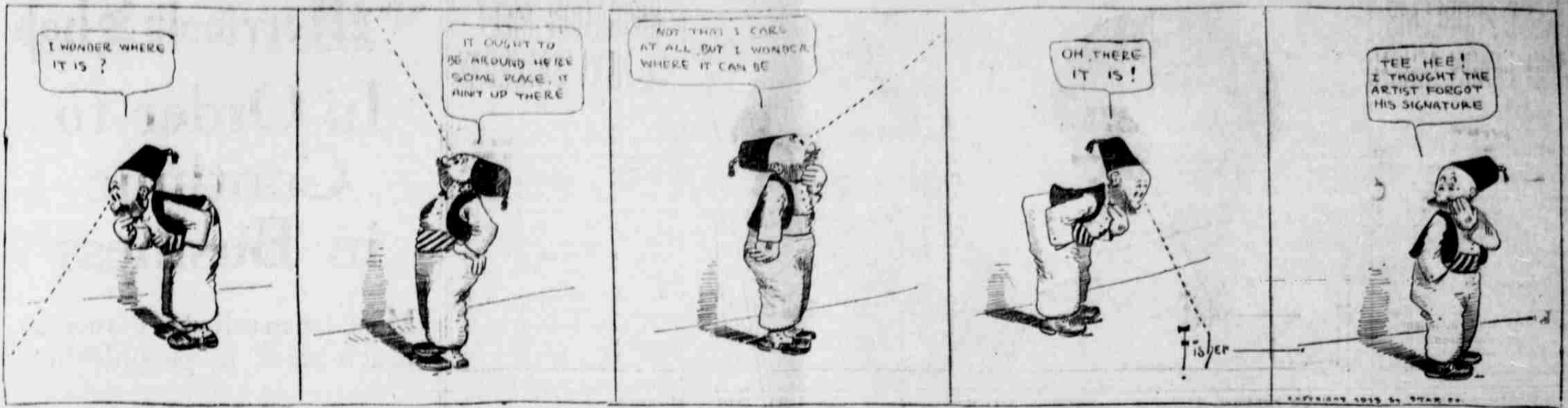


Jeff Was Scared Until He Found It

ORDINANCE NO. 732.

An ordinance providing for the construction of an 8-inch lateral sewer along East Eleventh street from Portland avenue to Ashland avenue, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on the property directly benefited thereby and adjacent thereto, and providing a meeting of the council to consider protests against said construction and assessment and the serving of the owners of such property with notice thereof.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is the intention of the council to cause a lateral sewer to be constructed along East Eleventh street from Portland avenue to Ashland avenue and to assess the cost thereof upon the property directly benefited thereby and adjacent thereto.

Sec. 2. The council will hear and consider any protests against said construction and the assessing of said property for the cost thereof at a meeting of the council to be held March 4th, 1913, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. in the council chamber in said city, and all property owners of property adjacent to said sewer and benefited thereby are hereby called upon to appear before said council at said time and place, and show cause, if any they have, why said construction should not be made and the cost thereof so assessed.

Sec. 3. The city recorder is hereby directed to serve notice thereof upon the property owners aforesaid, by causing three copies of this ordinance to be posted in three public places in said city, and said ordinance to be published once in a daily newspaper published and of general circulation in the city, at least ten days before the date of said meeting.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, on the 18th day of February, 1913, by the following vote: Mitchell, "aye"; Porter, "aye"; Campbell, "aye"; Stewart, "aye"; Summerville, "aye"; and Millar, "aye."
