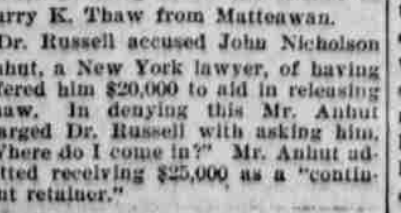

DR. RUSSELL, UNDER FIRE IN THAW CASE, RESIGNS



Dr. John W. Russell has resigned as superintendent of the Mattheawan (N. Y.) State Hospital for the Criminal Insane. Dr. Russell's resignation is the result of the inquiry into recent efforts to bring about the release of Harry K. Thaw from Mattheawan. Dr. Russell accused John Nicholson Anhut, a New York lawyer, of having offered him \$20,000 to aid in releasing Thaw. In denying this Mr. Anhut charged Dr. Russell with asking him, "Where do I come in?" Mr. Anhut admitted receiving \$25,000 as a "continuing retainer."

THAW GIVEN LIBERTY AT INSANE ASYLUM

NEW YORK, March 5.—That Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, came and went freely from Mattheawan insane asylum during the superintendency of Dr. John W. Russell, who resigned last week, was learned today. Governor Sulzer has ordered Dr. Leak, acting superintendent of the asylum, to treat Thaw the same as other patients and permit him to confer with his attorneys only in the presence of an attendant.

Dr. Leak is investigating reports that Thaw was allowed to leave the asylum secretly on several occasions.
